## WEDDINGS IN KENT AND ELSEWHERE

Despatches from Canada announce the wedding of Miss Carmen Calbet, daughter of the prominent English government official residing at Brantford, Ontario, to Professor Reginald Lawrence Carroll de Nevel Ford, of Washington College. The ceremony was solemnized at 9.15 on the morning of June 22 at the historic old Mohawk Church, seven miles from Brantford, by the Venerable Arch Deacon Canon Rev. Mr. Fotheringham, of the Church of England.

Special permission from the government was necessary in order that the church might be used. It is the oldest Protestant Church in Canada and was built especially by the Canadian government for the Mohawk tribe of the Iroquois race.

The church was decorated by maidens of the Mohawk tribe with tasteful floral wreaths and streamers draped gracefully throughout the famous old edifice. Young chieftains of the Mohawk tribe acted as ushers for the small group of friends, including the Lieutenant-Governor of the Dominion, the Sheriff of Ontario, and other appointees of the British crown.

After the ceremony in His Majesty's Chapel of the Mohawks, Professor and Mrs. Ford travelled through scenic old Canada, thru the picturesque Thousand Islands, to Montreal, where Professor Ford is completing his studies in the field of Modern Languages at McGill University.

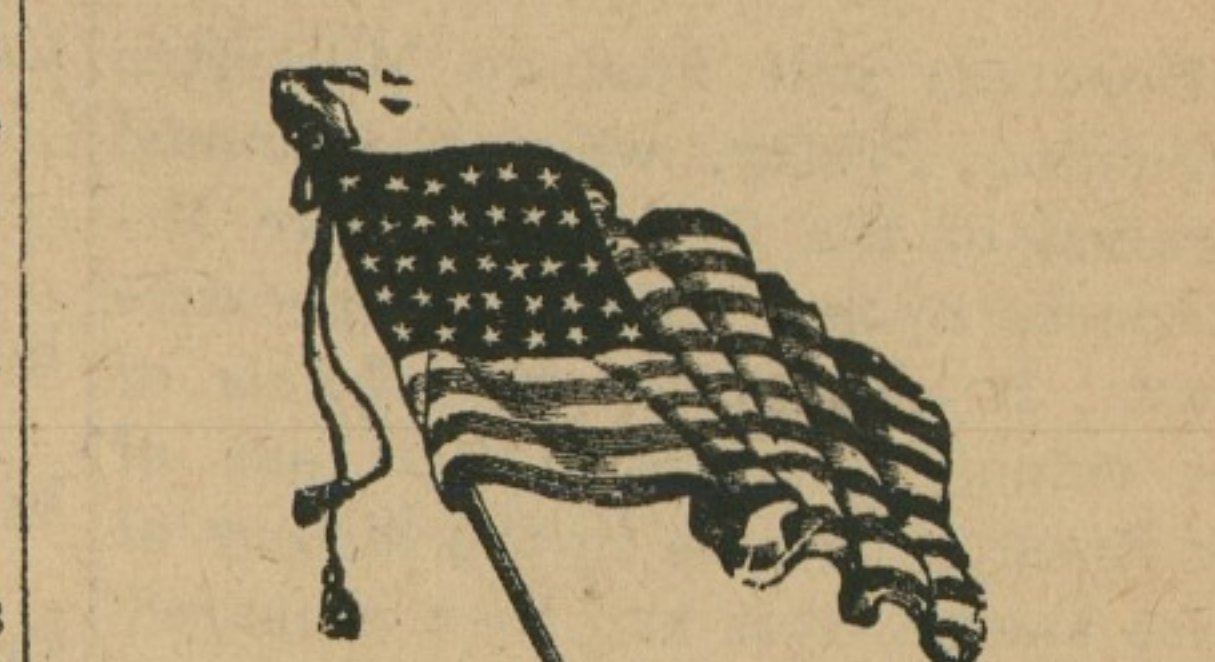

## CHESTERTOWN NEARLY BEING GREYNA GREED

Elkton has been in the lime light for some time because of the ease with which couples from anywhere could obtain a marriage license and be united in wedlock. Professed ministers did nothing else but marry couples and made as high as \$3,000 per year.

With the inauguration of a new county clerk the rules of the office were changed so that licenses are issued at certain hours only. This new regime caused many to turn to Chestertown and the news seemed to spread so that this place has become a rival to Elkton. There were four licenses issued by Clerk Ayres Sunday and one recently near midnight while another couple appeared at sunrise. The Methodist pastors marry the majority of the couples.

There have been 55 couples granted licenses during the past month and 366 for the fiscal year.

Legality of about 500 marriages performed since the first of the year by the Rev. Richard P. Westien, the "marrying parson" at Elkton, now is in doubt.

The Rev. J. W. Colona, district superintendent of the Wilmington M. E. Conference, has declared the minister is without orders and therefore not qualified to perform marriage ceremonies.

He has sent a request to State's Attorney Henry L. Constable of Cecil county asking that Westien be enjoined from performing further marriages.

Westien claims he received elder's orders as a local preacher from the Upper Iowa Conference of the M. E. Church in 1908. He was tried and found guilty by a jury of federation churchmen of charges of commercializing the solemn offices of marriage in 1921 and his orders cancelled.

About January 1 of this year he began marrying couples.

Bishop William F. McDowell, of Washington, who is in charge of the area which includes Elkton, said the minister's orders have been cancelled and therefore he had no right to perform the marriages.

State's Attorney Constable said he would confer with Thomas H. Robinson, Attorney-General, after which he would be able to decide more definitely on any steps that might be taken.

The Rev. Hiram McVey, a retired member of the Philadelphia Conference of the M. E. Church, arrived in Elkton Tuesday from his home in Greenwood, Del. He showed his credentials to Mr. Constable and in the morning five couples were married by him. Mr. Westien performed no marriage ceremony Monday.

Two Kent county automobiles were nearly demolished in week-end accidents.

A car driven by George A. Cornell and with his 90-year-old father, brother, and niece as passengers struck a telephone pole at McLane's Corner, on the road to Tolchester, when the brakes failed to hold. The pole was struck head on and only the presence of a bumper on the front of the car saved the occupants from serious injury. All were badly shaken and bruised. The body of the cars was wrenched out of shape, windshield and radiator ruined.

The second accident occurred when the car of Bennett Willson, of Rock Hall, and driven by him, failed to make the turn at Dixon's Turn, near here, on the Elkton road. The occupants of the car besides Mr. Willson, were Frank Capper and an asparagus cutter from near Rock Hall. Mr. Willson's car was demolished.
