Miss Mildred Sorden, 22 years old, 421 North Monroe street, Baltimore, died Tuesday from injuries received when she was struck by a motor truck on the State road near Fairlee. She was crossing the road to get the mail from Mail Driver Thomas Willis, it was said, and had been driven by Albert Collins, colored, of Dover, Del., struck her. The front wheels of the machine passed over her body before it could be brought to a stop. Miss Sorden was brought to Chestertown, where Dr. H. G. Simpers advised that she be removed to the hospital at Easton. She died while being taken to Easton in an ambulance owned by Wm. T. Hicks. The truck is owned by Biters Bros., of Dover. The deceased was a daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Wade Sorden, of Baltimore, Md. Mrs. Sorden before marriage was Miss Gertrude Stewart, an own cousin of George P. Hendrickson, at whose home, on the John P. Nicholson farm, she was visiting. The body was prepared for burial by W. T. Hicks and shipped to Baltimore where services and interment was held yesterday. Robert Collins was held under bail for action of grand jury by jury of inquest.

## KENT BOYS MAKING GOOD

Effective August 1, county jails in Maryland were allowed to charge 75 cents a day for care of Federal prisoners, it was disclosed this week by George W. Collier, United States Marshall. The new rate, it was explained, is an advance of 10 to 15 cents a day over previous allowances. There are now confined in twenty county jails 108 Federal prisoners. Mr. Collier said. The new rate is still 25 cents below what Baltimore city jail officials demand.

## M. E. CHURCH TO RE-OPEN SEPT. 25

With the \$70,000 improvement building at the Chestertown Methodist Episcopal Church rapidly nearing completion, plans are being made for the opening of the church and its dedication. Dr. W. F. Cochran, pastor of the church, announced today that the building will be opened to the public on Sunday, September 25, for the first time. The dedication will take place on the following Sunday, October 2. There will be special preaching every night during the week from September 25 to October 2. The work upon the church has been in progress for several months. During this time the services have been held in the Chestertown High School Auditorium.

Dr. J. H. Willey, of Montclair, N. J., will be the speaker on the opening day, September 25, at both morning and evening services. According to Dr. Cochran the speakers for Monday and Friday evenings of the week of special services have not yet been secured. On Tuesday, September 27, Rev. J. W. Wilson, a former pastor of the local church will be the speaker. Rev. J. W. Wilson will deliver the sermon on Wednesday evening.

A former District Superintendent of this district, Reverend Dr. Smith, will be the preacher on Thursday evening. On Saturday there will be special preaching and the basement of the church will be dedicated to educational and social work in the community.

Sunday, October 2, the Dedication Day, will see Bishop W. F. McDowell of Washington, D. C., delivering the sermon at the morning services. In the evening of the same day Dr. W. W. Wilson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., will be the speaker. Dr. Wilson will speak again on Monday evening, October 3, at which time he will give his famous lecture, "Fifty Years in the Ministry."

Dr. Cochran said today that there would be special music at all of the services. This program will be in charge of Mrs. Merrick Clements. The church authorities are expecting record crowds to attend all of these special services and are making plans to accommodate them. One of the features of the improvement structure will be the basement in which will be held the church suppers and similar functions.

## CHESTERTOWN'S BIG CARNIVAL NEXT WEEK

Preparations are being made for the third annual carnival for the Volunteer Fire Company on the public square. Major Frank B. Hines, in charge of a sham battle on Washington College campus, in which Eastern Shore National Guardsmen will participate, informed officials that this feature is assured.

It is certain that this feature of the carnival will attract the largest crowd ever seen in Chestertown and will prove a record event in the history of the Shore. The other big event of the affair is the pageant which will be held on Tuesday evening, September 13, when practically every fire company on the peninsula has accepted invitations to contest for prizes offered for various distinctions.

The sham battle will be the feature event for Thursday evening, September 15. Officials of the fire company are striving to create a large maintenance fund which within a year or two will be sufficient to provide sufficient revenue and provide additional equipment without resorting to annual fetes.

The company's invested fund amounts to \$5,000, and it is believed the forthcoming carnival will swell this fund to at least \$8,000. It is believed that a fund of \$10,000 will be sufficient to provide the necessary annual maintenance revenue. President Wm. G. Smyth has appointed committees for the carnival attractions and Fire Chief Russell is arranging the details of the pageant.

A demonstration on judging dairy cattle was given by Stanley B. Sutton, Walter Morris and Wilbur Morris, the three champion calf club members who represented Maryland at the National Show and one represented the United States at the International Contest.

The winners in the judging contest was as follows: Albert Sutton, first; Norman Pennington and Franklin Moffett tied for second place and Edwin McCrea was third. Stock judging calves were given as prizes.

## CLUB BOYS TO JUDGE AT TIMONIUM FAIR

The State Dairy Cattle Judging Contest, always a big event among 4-H Club boys of the State will be held at the Timonium Fair September 5 to 10 with every prospect for spirited competition among the dozen or more county teams which will take part in it.

The contest will not only decide the dairy cattle judging championship of the State so far as 4-H Club Members are concerned, but will determine the three boys who will represent Maryland in the National Junior Dairy Cattle Judging Contest at the National Dairy Show in Memphis in October.

The prize for which every boy will work hardest is the trip to the National Dairy Show, provided by the officials of the Timonium Fair. The county teams placing first, second and third in the contest will be awarded silver cups. In addition sixteen individual money prizes are offered for the boys making the best scores in judging each of the four different breeds of cattle.

Last year the State contest was won by the team from Kent County. The boys from this team, Wilbur Morris, Jr., and Walter Morris, one boy from the Frederick County team, Austin Miller, represented Kent at the National Dairy Show and placed second among the twenty-one teams entered.

## DAIRYMEN MEETING WELL ATTENDED

Dairymen from all sections of the county attended an open meeting on the farm of Edgar R. Pennington, of near Kennedyville, Friday when representatives of the Interstate Milk Producers' Association and directors of the Philadelphia Dairy Council discussed important dairy problems with leading dairymen and farmers.

Addresses on the importance of the development of the dairy industry from a scientific standpoint and the pressing necessity for the production of pure milk through a thorough tuberculin test of all dairy cattle in the county, which is regarded as the most vital problem confronting the dairymen of the entire peninsula today, were made.

H. S. Allebach, of the Milk Producers Association; C. I. Cohee and Mr. Willets, of the Dairy Council, who are visiting peninsula dairymen to arouse dairymen to the importance of safeguarding the industry with approved sanitary conditions and in growing only such feed crops as will produce the largest quantity of milk per cow, spoke.

Following the conference, which County Agent Derrick believes will prove of untold good to the dairymen of Kent, an inspection of about twenty of the finest dairy cows and calves belonging to members of the 4-H Boys Calf Club and the Holstein herd belonging to Mr. Pennington, was made by Mr. Pennington, President National Council, P. ## PROF. FONTAINE WILL MOVE TO CHESTERTOWN FROM POCOMOKE CITY, MD.

Prof. E. Clarke Fontaine has decided to leave Pocomoke City, and will take up his residence in Chestertown, Md., moving here in the near future.

Prof. Fontaine is influenced by several considerations in making this change, one of which is that Chestertown is a more central point from which to prosecute his work of State high school supervisor. Pocomoke is being located so near the southern end of the peninsula made some of his journeys to reach home at weekends very lengthy. In Kent, he will be enabled to so arrange his itinerary as to reduce materially his mileage at the close of the week.

Prof. Fontaine has purchased, in Chestertown, the home of the late Capt. and Mrs. Curtis E. Crane, located on Water street, one of the most delightful residential sections of the town. It is within a stone's throw of the beautiful Chester river, and in the midst of the homes of some of Chestertown's most cordial and socially prominent citizens. Mr. Crane, at the time of his death, was a member of the Marvill Package Co. The purchase of the property was negotiated through Senator Withroft of Easton, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Crane.

Pocomoke City and community wish Mr. Fontaine and family a sojourn of pleasant association with Kent people and, without a doubt, they will experience just that.

Dr. E. J. Clarke, editor of the Pocomoke paper, in addition to what is stated above further states, "Another reason probably influencing Mr. Fontaine is that in Chestertown, there are school buildings so up-to-date in their construction and appointment as to insure what he believes a better training for his children. No matter how efficient a faculty may be, if the material needs are not at hand, the same grade of work can not be done as is accomplished in modern day institutions. Being as he should be, much concerned in the advancement of his own children, he has taken a step to which he feels he was more or less driven by conditions in his native county.

He regrets very much that he is to leave his home, and no doubt he will always look back to it as the only place he can ever really call home. This community is sensible of a distinct loss in the departure of one whose connection with the place has ever added honor and distinction to it. Prof. Fontaine has always been in the educational work and has made an eminent success of his chosen profession. Whenever called upon he has always served the people here in any capacity he could, and the people look upon him as one of their most favored sons. Chestertown can be congratulated upon the acquisition of a man whose contribution to its welfare can always be depended upon, and whatever he gives will be backed by sound judgment and an intellect few possess.

## BETTERTON REALTY CO. SELL 5 FARMS
