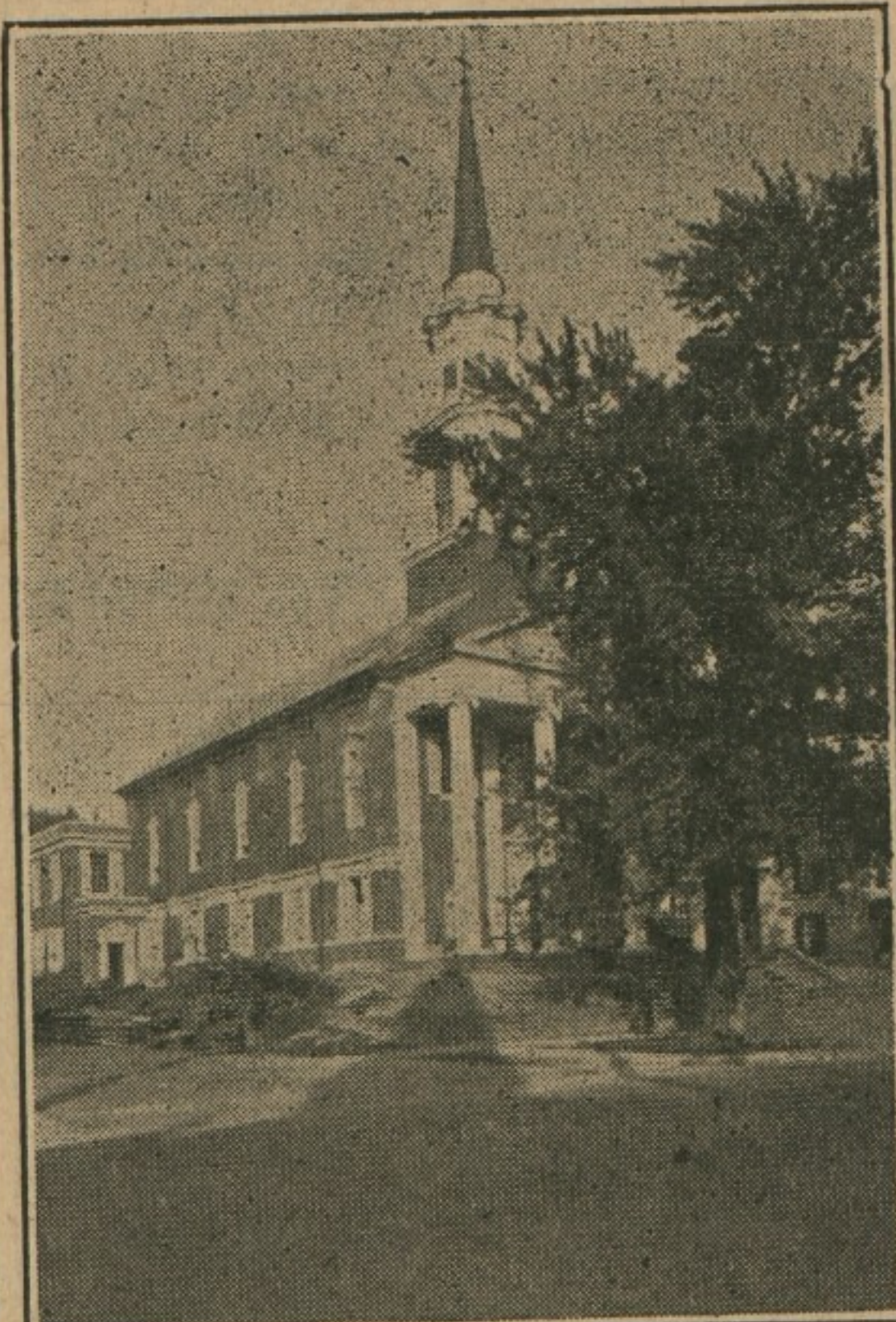

Monday evening, 26th. All week night services begin at 7.30. Special music this evening by the choir of Emmanuel Protestant Episcopal Church of Chestertown. Sermon by the Rev. H. R. McDade, Rev. Sketch Of Chestertown Methodism

Methodist preachers came into this section very early in the progress of Methodism in this country. Kent circuit was one of the very early appointments and Chestertown was the head of the circuit.
The first Methodist church was built about the year 1799. That building still stands near the front of the Voshell House attesting the permanence of the Methodist movement in the minds of the builders. The Chestertown church became a station, that is, a due church appointment in the year 1868.
The present splendid location was donated to the Board of Trustees by John N. Suitton, for many years a prominent Methodist of the town, and to the church built thereon was dedicated in the year 1875. This was one of the prominent church buildings in the Wilmington Conference when it was built and served the society splendidly for fifty two years.

For the past ten years there has been a growing conviction that the church should either build a new one, so as to furnish larger and better accommodations for its growing interests. Looking to that several architects had been consulted but unsatisfactory plans had been hit upon until an Architect and Engineer of Milburn, New Jersey, was asked to make some sketches of his suggested plans for rebuilding. After numerous meetings between the architect and a building committee plans and specifications were agreed upon and bids were asked for the work of rebuilding. The contract was awarded to Roland Dashiell, of Salisbury, Maryland. Work was begun in December 1926 and finished in October 1927. This rebuilt church is to be dedicated, October 2nd, 1927. The total expenditure was about \$65,000.

The building committee is composed of John C. Davis, Chairman; M. E. Newsome, A. H. Covey, Harry F. Jefferson, Carl N. Bordley, Ramsey Anthony.
The finance committee is composed of Herbert E. Perkins, Chairman; W. B. Copper, Treasurer; Wm. T. Hicks, Harry H. Klinefelter, Robert Moffett, James S. Kreeger, and the late lamented M. A. Toulson.
All the members of these committees have done their work with ready hands and glad hearts. The people have responded with splendid liberality and all the present problems of the church are in solution.

With up-to-date church and parsonage property, beautifully located, a united, liberal, loyal people and a growing community Chestertown Methodism enters upon a new era of her saving work.
