BOY HAS 400 DUROC JERSEYS

This is the story of a boy who went to an exposition, saw hogs and determined to raise them and win a name for himself in the eastern states of this country. He is Wm. R. Hill, 23-year-old son of George A. Hill, Federal prohibition director in Delaware. His home is in Bridgeville. To date he has about 400 big type Duroc Jersey hogs in his herd, and is gradually gaining the reputation of having the best herd in this part of the country.
When young Hill takes his hogs to exhibitions, he is recognized and remembered. He is inevitably dressed as a western cowboy. Large 10-gallon hat, checkered shirt, and boots, but instead of a horse his steed is a high-powered motorcycle.
When Hill was in Bridgeville High School, he became interested in hog judging. He was on the Delaware State team that went to the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield, Mass., and there, in competition with representatives of 13 States, he made the highest score in hog judging.
While at the exposition, Hill saw some big type Duroc hogs, and when he came home he had determination to raise that type of hogs. He did, and within four years, he has raised a 400-head herd and has earned large sums of money by exhibiting them.
He recently went to Danbury, Conn., with about 22 head of hogs. One hog, Eureka, a junior yearling Duroc Jersey, never has been defeated and has won the blue ribbon in 14 states.

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
