MANY TELEPHONES IN USE

The Chesapeake and Potomac Company of Baltimore City now serves 194,542 telephones in Maryland which was an increase of 5,707 during 1927. To make this net gain Miss Smith states that the company installed 32,659 stations and disconnected 26,952. This means that it was necessary for the company to install more than 5 telephones to make a net gain of one. The national telephone system is also showing substantial increases, and there are now more than 18,300,000 telephones served by the Bell System. Of this number 3,300,000 have been added to the system since January 1, 1923. This means that more telephones were added to the system in the past five years than were operated by all of the Bell and connecting companies in 1926, thirty years after the telephone was invented. During that year there were only 3,000,000 telephones served by the Bell System.

The wire system of the telephone companies in the United States was increased by 4,200,000 miles during 1927 and there are now about 63,000,000 miles of telephone wire in use. Of this immense mileage more than 90 per cent is in underground cable. Cable, as much as any other factor, has been responsible for the great development of the telephone industry. Without cable containing thousands of wires, modern telephone systems could not exist. If it were still necessary to use open wire lines the number of streets in every city would have to be increased several times to allow for the use of pole lines and open wire to serve the demands for telephone service.
