DEL-MAR-VA PUBLICITY

Beginning Monday, March 5th, for a period of one week, literature and maps descriptive of the Del-Mar-Va Peninsula, prepared and issued by the Del-Mar-Va Eastern Shore Association, and booklets issued by individual communities in Del-Mar Va, will be on exhibition in a specially designed advertising display window at Baltimore street and Guilford avenue, Baltimore. This is the third busiest corner in the city of Baltimore where records show that many thousands of pedestrians pass daily.

This is the first general display of Del-Mar-Va literature which is has been possible to arrange. There will be practically thirty-six pieces of literature in the exhibit with an announcement that all interested may secure same by writing the Del-Mar-Va Association or individual Chambers of Commerce.

This means of advertising the Peninsula has been arranged without cost other than preparation by the Del-Mar-Va Eastern Shore Association through the courtesy of the Baltimore News and American. The exhibit is expected to prove one of the most attractive of its kind, offering a wide range of authentic and carefully compiled matter. Peninsula visitors to Baltimore during the coming week are requested by Association officials to visit the exhibit and offer their comment as to similar displays in other cities and metropolitan centers.

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THE PENINSULA MAGAZINE STORY

The Del-Mar-Va Peninsula has received national publicity in the March issue of Country Gentleman, a Curtis publication with circulation of more than 1,500,000, in an article written by E. H. Taylor, staff writer for that magazine.

Mr. Taylor visited Del-Mar-Va last fall at the request of the Del-Mar-Va Eastern Shore Association, and assisted by representatives of the Marketing Bureau and Publicity Department of the Association, obtained first hand data on the Peninsula as a whole.

With Country Gentleman reaching every section of this country and many foreign points, the extent to which facts about Del-Mar-Va will be carried may be readily recognized. Mr. Taylor's story, according to officials of the Del-Mar-Va Association, presents much of interest in a manner certain to call attention to the Peninsula and go far toward creating a wide-spread interest.

The Eastern Shore will get the championship game in the Statewide high school basketball tournament being staged this year by the Playground Athletic League of Maryland and the titular game will be played sometime during the week of March 19th.

Four counties on the Eastern Shore have entered the tourney—Kent, Talbot, Somerset and Wicomico while 11 will contest for honors in the Western division.

Intra-county games are already in progress the schedules being arranged by the respective Boards of Education. These must be concluded by March 1, after which date the P. T. L. will arrange the inter-county schedules. Whenever possible the latter will be played in State armories.

According to observers Crisfield High in Somerset; Wicomico High in Wicomico; and Chestertown High, in Kent, loom as the strongest contenders for county honors.

Wicomico High, this season, has met but two defeats in high school circles those at the hands of the Laurel, Del., quint. Chestertown High, which uses the Washington College gym are having a very formidable five.

Marion Davies In "Quality Street" At Lyceum

There is probably no other famous play in existence demanding so much whimsical action in the delicate situations, yet Sir James Barrie who saw his "Kiss of Cinderella" and "Peter Pan" produced so successfully as motion pictures, did not hesitate to entrust his favorite work to Miss Davies.

Through a screen version of the stage play has lost none of its delicacy and whimsy through the masterful handling of Hans Kraly and Albert Lewin, scenarists.

The character of Phoebe Throssel, so beloved to America's theatregoers who saw the role played by Maude Adams, is still the quaint and whimsical Phoebe through Miss Davies' wonderful portrayal.

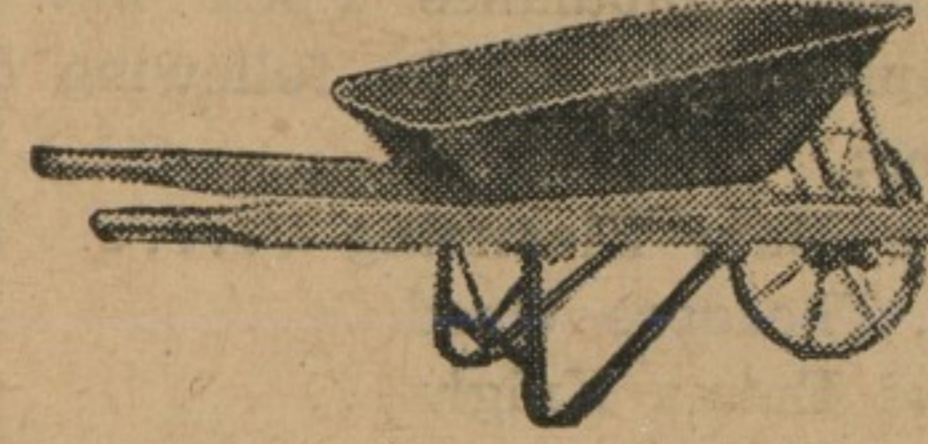

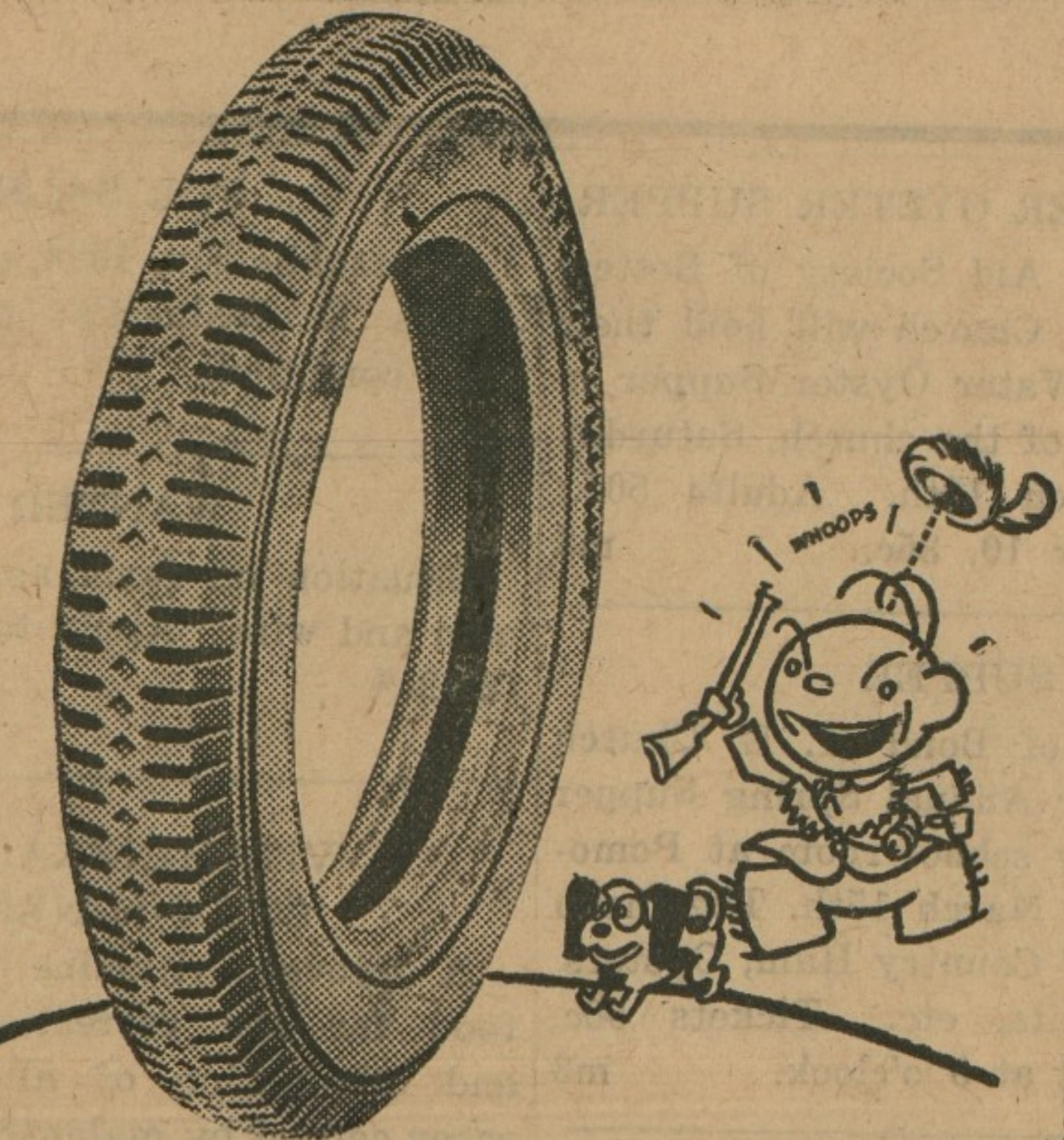
