

EVERY convenience that could possibly be built into a mechanica spreading unit has been embodied in the construction of the new McCormick-Deering. With a carrying capacity of from  $57\frac{1}{2}$  to  $67\frac{1}{2}$ bushels the box is built low which permits easy loading.

The levers on both sides of the spreader are within convenient reach of the operator. Six conveyor speeds permit placing more or less manure on certain spots as desired. The driver can instantly regulate the quantity of flow while the spreader is in operation. The short wheelbase, tracking of the front and rear wheels, and the auto-steer front truck makes the McCormick-Deering a strong, durable, light-draft spreader.


