## NAT'L CENSUS OF TOMATOES

The Bureau of Census report of spot holdings as of December 31st 1927, of corn, pear and tomatoes reached The News this week.

The total holdings are 12,051,787 cases of all sizes of corn; 11,225,324 cases all sizes of peas and 9,234,572 as 3's of tomatoes.

The average supply of tomatoes for the past five years has been 15,290,468 cases reduced to No. 3 cans. On that basis there should have been on hand December 31, 1927, 11,467,851 cases to run us so October 1st, 1928. Hence our holdings December 31, 1927, are at least 2,233,279 cases short of our usual supply December 31 of each year.

It is maintained right along that tomatoes were in a strong position statistically, and the low prevailing market unjustified.

The Bureau of Census report of spot holdings of canned tomatoes on December 31, 1927, show a startling distribution of this product. On De-

ember 31 the canners had only 8,326,173 cases all sizes left on hand out of a pack of 18,870,894 cases of all sizes.

This shows shipments to distributors from the close of the canning season to December 31st of 10,544,721 cases. During the year distributors had received the equivalent of 3,277,000 cases of No. 2 cans of imported tomatoes, a total of 13,821,721 cases not taking into count the millions of cases carried over from 1925 and 1926.

The report shows distributors had remaining on hand out of this, on December 31, only 5,111,858 cases, a distribution to retail trade of 8,709,863 cases in October, November and December with a visible supply of only 13,438,031 cases to tide over the remaining nine months.

### \$1,000,000 FIRE AT CRISFIELD

Fire, which broke out in the Arcade Theatre, Crisfield, last week, virtually wiped out the uptown business section of that town. The conflagration was said by the Crisfield chief to have been of even more serious proportions than the Pocomoke City disaster of several years ago. Some 50 buildings were razed. The loss is estimated at upwards of \$1,000,000. One young man was injured, fatally by being pinned beneath falling walls. Two of the local firemen were hurt neither seriously, by flying debris. Five other out-of-town volunteer companies responded to a call for assistance.

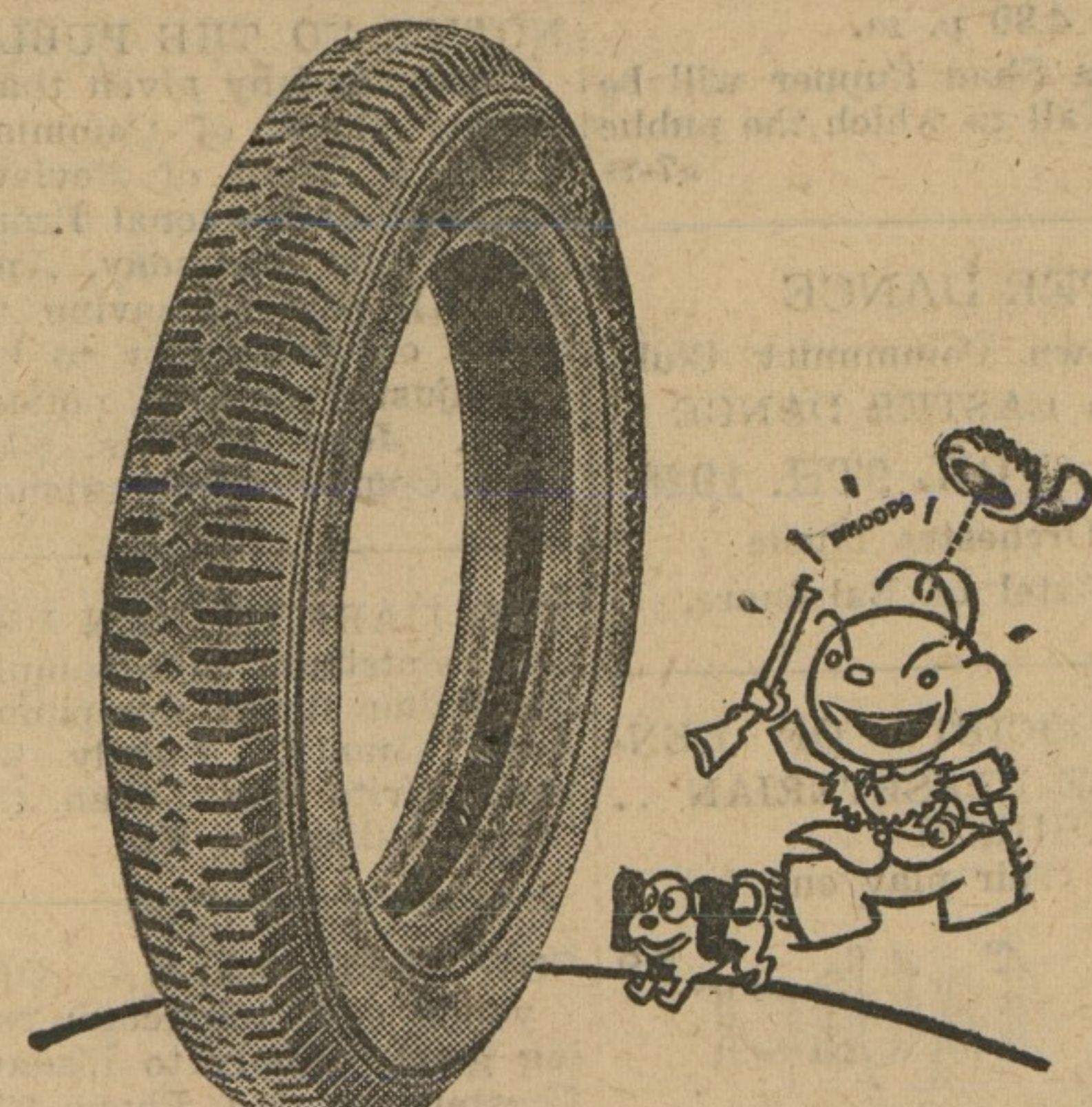
