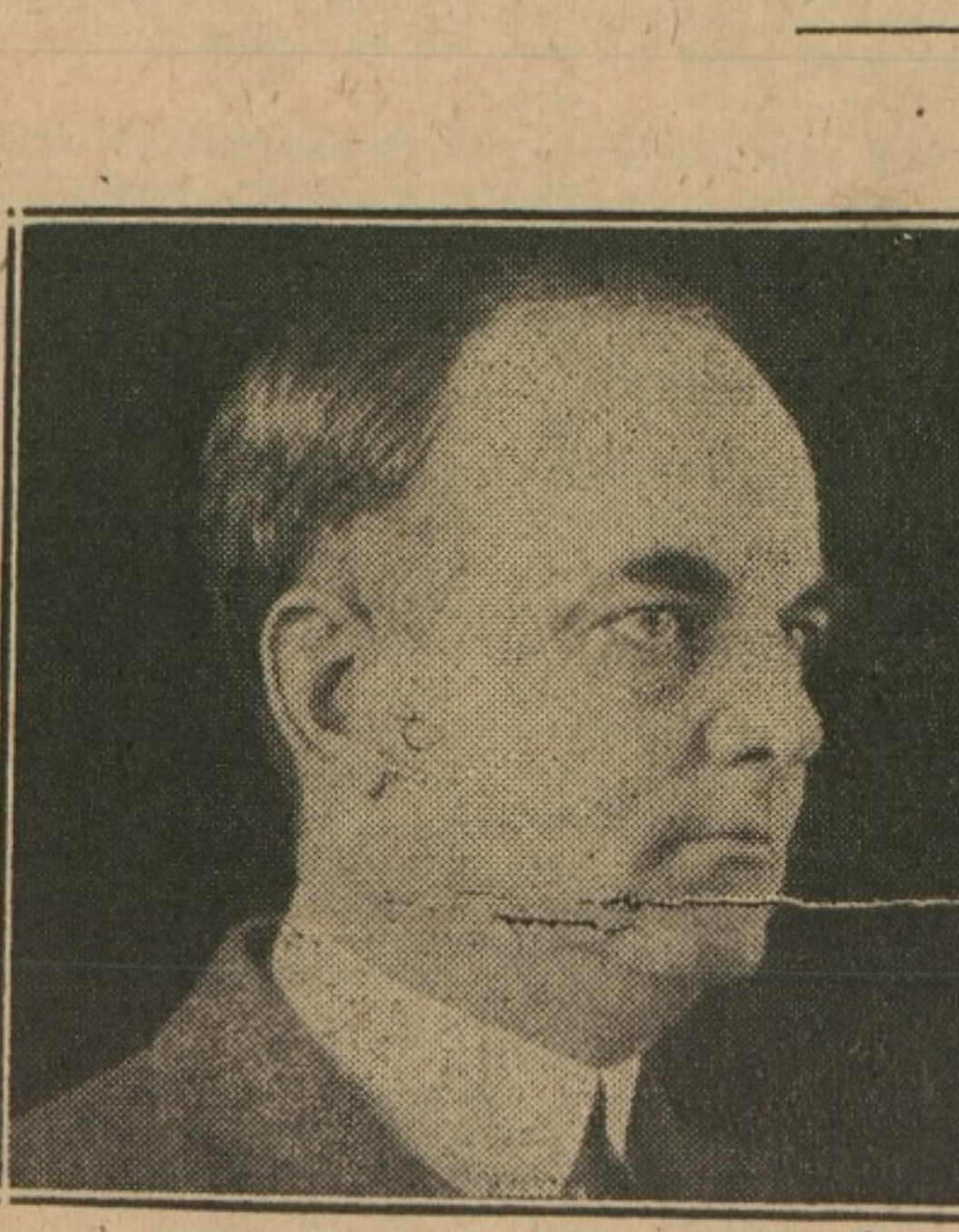

Senator S. Scott Beck has been visiting the counties on the Shore this week. Everywhere he went he found friends, and thinks he will poll a fine vote in all of the counties Monday.

Thomas Massey, Mayses, Md.

Thos. W. Perkins was named one of the trustees of the Episcopal fund.

Three Eastern Shore prisoners were paroled by Governor Ritchie Tuesday. James Lett, a Negro of Kent county who was serving a twelve month sentence for assaulting another man in a fight was one of them.

## ROCK HALL DEDICATES ITS FIRE HOUSE

The dedication of the new Rock Hall firehouse, recently completed took place Thursday afternoon and a new fire engine installed.

The pumper, which will relieve the local firemen of the necessity of hauling water from the Chesapeake bay, cost \$8,500. The dedicatory ceremonies started at 4:30 p. m. The principal speakers were Capt. Harry Butler, commander of the Maryland State police force; Howard Travers, battalion chief of the Baltimore Bureau, and President Wm. G. Smyth, of the Chestertown Volunteer Fire Company.

Trev Durdin is chief of the local company and was chairman of the exercises. President Herbert A. Urie of the Rock Hall company opened the ceremonies. An American flag, donated by Mrs. Max Alexander, was presented by Mr. Alexander to the company and the Rev. W. S. Grant, pastor of Rock Hall M. E. Church delivered the dedicatory address. The Firemen's Band of 30 pieces furnished music. A 75,000 gallon tank has been installed for fire prevention purposes as well as to provide the town with adequate water supply. The building dedicated, is a concrete block structure, and contains a community room on the second floor.

The supper realized about \$200.

## COURT FINALLY FINISHES LABORS

Owing to several removed cases an unusually long term of Court has just closed in Kent county. State's Attorney Collins has tried his cases with ability and to the satisfaction of all but those convicted. He obtained a conviction in nearly every case presented.

The News presents the proceedings as noted from last week.

In the case of Charles Butler, charged with burglary at the store of B. F. Caulk, Butler pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 15 months in House of Correction.

Jess Ringgold, on the same charge, plead not guilty but was found guilty by the jury and sentenced by the Court to two years in the Maryland Penitentiary.

James E. Rice presented for false pretense on Olin B. Stafford despite his plea of not guilty was found guilty and sentenced to three months in the House of Correction.

The suit of Harry Corridan, of Elkton, against the mayor an deomissioners of that town for \$10,000 for alleged personal injuries suffered last summer. It was removed from Cecil county court and was tried here Wednesday and a verdict of \$200 in favor of plaintiff.

W. A. Warburton and Harrison W. Vickers represented the plaintiff and Joshua Clayton and W. F. Russell, Jr., the Elkton Commissioners.

The case was heard before a jury of which Wm. S. Collins was foreman. On the jury were A. Leon Brown, Frank V. Simpers, John C. Davis, Ernest D. Briscoe, James M. Lasby, Thomas W. Eliason, John E. Moore, John R. Dowling, Conlyn E. Noland, Horace Reed and Oscar Faucett.

The Warren Brown case was continued to October.

State vs. Andrew Perry, charged with selling liquor. Plead guilty, verdict guilty and fined \$150 and costs or two months in the county jail. Fines and costs were paid and Perry released.

State vs. Norman Merchant, charged with non-support of his wife and four minor children. Plead guilty to the non-support of three of the children and older child and the wife, claiming the older child was living with the defendant's mother who was supporting it. Court trial, verdict not guilty for non-support of the older child but guilty of non-support of his wife and the other three children and sentenced to pay to the wife \$30 a month for one year. S. Scott Beck for Mr. Merchant and S. R. Collins for the State.

State vs. Albert F. Savington for non-support of children. Court trial, plead guilty and sentenced to pay \$8 per week for one year. T. F. Healey for Savington and S. R. Collins for State.

The case of W. Roy Spring, of Talbot county, against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, for damages sustained in a shipment of wheat amounting to between \$350 and \$600 consumed the attention of the Circuit Court here for three days. Spring claims that a quantity of his wheat valued at \$1.35 a bushel leaked out of old and faulty cars while being shipped. S. Scott Beck, Wm. Mason Shehan and Mr. Marshall represented the railroad while W. F. Russell, Jr., and W. E. Miller made a hard fight for the plaintiffs. When this case was finished a case removed from Caroline county involving five suits against a canning company for the death of a number of children caused by an explosion in the cannerly was called but a compromise was effected before the trial.

Court adjourned on Monday until Wednesday.

**ROCK HALL NINE BEATS CHESTERTOWN**
