## FEW TUBERCULAR COWS FOUND IN GARRETT

Since last April when 1,679 cows in Garrett county have been tested for tuberculosis, only 10 have been found infected. This percentage is the best in Maryland, according to County Agent J. L. McGloone.

Dr. D. E. Poe and Dr. M. H. Trout, veterinarians of the Department of Agriculture, have been in the county nearly seven weeks making tests and will continue their work until all who own their cattle tested have

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
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
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
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
