COMMENCEMENT DAYS NOW AT WASHINGTON COLLEGE

THE COMMENCEMENT MUSICAL PROGRAM

This program will mark the last appearance of some of the present members of the clubs due to graduation. The orchestra will lose two of its present membership, while the glee club will lose three of its membership. With the opening of the school year, however, the clubs expect to gain new members from the incoming freshman class.

The series of concerts marks an innovation in the musical life of the college. To date, the concerts have been well attended, and it is the hope of the sponsors of the programs to promote a series of Sunday afternoon concerts for the coming school year a concert to be given once each month during the school year. With the joint effort of the musical organizations from the community and the college musical clubs, such a program should be possible for the coming school year.

The debate at the college Thursday evening for the Samuel Towner prize was won by Mr. Vernon Literary Society team. Miss Richardson was awarded first prize and Mr. Poole second.

MEMORIAL DAY IN CHESTERTOWN

Memorial Day was a notable occasion in Chestertown. The program was in charge of Frank M. Jarman Post of the American Legion with C. Lee Gill in command.

The parade started at 10 a. m. and led to Chester Cemetery where the graves of the soldier dead were decorated and taps sounded. David Winebrenner, 3rd, Secretary of State for Maryland, made a splendid address. Prayers were offered by Rev. L. C. Randall and Rev. C. L. Dawson both members of the American Legion.

The parade, forming at the foot of High street, had in line the Frank M. Jarman Post 36, a detachment from the local Medical Unit, the Chestertown Fire Company and its splendid band, two fire trucks, Camp Fire Girls under Miss Doris Bell and Boy Scouts with Rev. C. L. Atwater.

In the afternoon the automobile parade was held and was witnessed by hundreds.

The float of the Women's Auxiliary of the Chestertown Volunteer Fire Company was awarded first prize \$25.00.

Second prize went to the car of Norman Lee. This prize was for \$15. Third prize \$10, went to the car of Hynson Carter, and fourth prize, \$5, to the car of T. E. Joiner.

The judges were Cashiers W. R. Huey, Harry Coleman and Charles F. Wheatley.

A game of base ball took place at the college after the shower between Rock Hall and the Legion. Rock Hall won 4 to 1. It was a fine game and a royal battle between Williams who pitched for Rock Hall and Blackway who was in the box for the Legion.

The two Camp Fire Groups marched in the Memorial Day parade in memory of the dead who fought in the World War. All the girls sold poppies for the American Legion. A ceremonial meeting was held on last Monday. Gladys Rebecca Aldridge, Dorothy Vickers, Alice Dole, Mary Woodland Westcott, Elizabeth Westcott and Wills Newman became Wood Gatherers, which is the first rank.

The Chestertown Bank of Maryland at a recent meeting of the Board of Directors decided definitely to erect a modern banking house on the site of the R. F. Parks property on High street and the Board of Directors will make an inspection next week of some modern bank buildings in several towns.

CHESTERTOWN WINS THE STORY CONTEST

A Chestertown high school girl Miss Louise D. Simpers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank V. Simpers, has been selected as champion of the State of Maryland in the Fifth National Meat Story Contest, it was announced today. Miss Simpers' story was chosen from among 16,000 submitted to receive one of the principal prizes awarded.

The contest is one conducted annually among high school students of home economics throughout the U. S. by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Under the rules of the contest, the United States was divided into four districts. Miss Simpers ranked fourth in the Eastern district. The championship of this district was won by Miss Ellen B. Alpigini, of Merchantville, N. J. Miss Agnes Childress, of Ordway, Colo., was declared National Champion.

The judges in the contest were four women well-known in the field of home economics throughout the United States.

Miss Simpers' story was entitled "The Meat Packing Industry."

REAL ESTATE STILL ACTIVE

Harry Cacy has sold his fine farm of 102 acres at Lynch to W. Bradford Copper. It is reported that the price was around \$100 per acre and that Jesse H. Copper will tenant the same next year.

Morris Clothier, of Philadelphia has purchased the George W. Harper farm, near Turner's Creek. This farm makes about 1400 acres in one tract owned by Mr. Clothier and managed by Mr. Blair.

John T. Newsome has purchased of Harry Rash his farm near Melittota containing 202 acres and his son will occupy same next year.

The trustees of C. S. Hurlock estate have sold to Jonathan Jones, of Millington, the 652 acre farm in Queen Anne's for \$12,500.

One of the largest sales of real estate to occur in Seaford for some time took place Saturday afternoon in front of the Hotel Sussex, when the Woodland Orchards Farm, containing over 800 acres, 250 of which are set to apple and peach trees, together with considerable valuable timber, was sold at sheriff's sale to satisfy a mortgage of about \$23,000 held by the Sharpturn, Md., bank of the Eastern Shore Trust Company.

The farm, originally a part of the Blockson farm, White farm and Neal farm, located between Seaford and Woodland, was purchased several years ago by the E. S. Adkins and Company, Salisbury, Md., and the late State Senator Orlando Harrison, of Berlin, Md., who improved it by setting out apple and peach trees. The improvements on the farm are dwelling houses, stables, barns, fruit packing houses, tenant houses and outbuildings. The farm was sold to E. S. Adkins and Company for \$23,850.20.

PURSE NET FLEET READY FOR ACTION

One of the largest fleets of purse-net fishermen to sail from Rock Hall is ready for operations when the season opens June 15.

Ten large boats with a total crew of about seventy-five will engage in purse-net fishing this summer, with headquarters at Rock Hall.

Due to the small amount of rock caught during the winter and early spring, purse-netters are uncertain of the outlook for large dips. Although several of the vessels made good catches last season, 1927 was a poor year for the majority of the fishermen.

The vessels from Kent usually confine their operations to the area south of Poole's Island and north of Kent Point. They seldom make dips south of Kent Island.
