YACHTSMEN IN NEW QUARTERS

Chesapeake Bay joined hands with the Delaware River to celebrate the formal opening of the new Chesapeake Bay headquarters of the Tri-State Yacht Club of Philadelphia, near here. The newly remodeled club house and the 200-acre premises shortly to be converted into a golf course were a revelation. They are located near Buck Neck.

Winners in the first race of the Chesapeake Invasion were announced by Larry Hess, chairman of the Regatta Committee of the Tri-State Yacht Club, following the opening address of welcome by Commodore Charles Walber.

The winners were, express cruisers: Clarella, owned by Vice-Commodore J. Howard Vansiver; cruisers rating over 35, Scheherazade, owned by George Nass, and cruisers rating under 35, Ocean Eagle, property of Olie Tottrupp.

That race was held Monday on the lower Delaware River, starting at the Delaware River home of the Tri-State Club at Essington and finishing off Fort Delaware, a distance of 24 nautical miles. The boats battled a stiff breeze and bucked a strong tide much of the way, but made good time nevertheless.

After the finish the boats proceeded through the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal and on down to the new anchorage at Worton Creek, where the fleet arrived shortly after dark at night.

Miss Helen Haley, of Philadelphia, piloted the speedboat Miss Tri-State and James Wolf was at the helm of the speedboat Follow Me, in an exhibition race. Miss Tri-State was a close winner.

Prominent yachtsmen from all corners of the bay were at Worton Creek for the club opening, among them being Commodore John P. Cosen, of the Miles River Yacht Club, of St. Michaels, who is also a member of the Tri-State Club. The scene of action shifted to St. Michaels when

the second and third races of the Tri-State campaign were staged, bringing the fleet to St. Michaels Wednesday night. At the end of the week the Miles River Yacht Club stages its annual regatta.

Vice Commodore J. Howard Vansiver turned in the principal victory with the triumph of his Clarella in the express cruiser class, when that boat from scratch triumphed by almost 16 minutes over the 24-mile course, from the New Nerita, owned by Addison Foster, and Spitfire, owned by Earl J. Vansiver. Spitfire had engine trouble, but kept on her way.

Olie Tottrupp's Ocean Eagle surprised by winning a close race from Commodore Charles Walber's Josephine by slightly over a minute, in the cruiser class rating under 35. The Scheherazade, owned by Geo. Nass was winner by five minutes in the high-rated cruiser class, over James H. Kerr's Katherine R., in a hard-fought race. Edgar Grison's Mary Virginia from scratch was well up for third.

Time honors for the first leg go to the Mary Virginia in the cruiser classes, with her record of 2:12.24 for the distance. Clarella's time of 1:27.30 was the equivalent of about 17 miles per hour for the race.

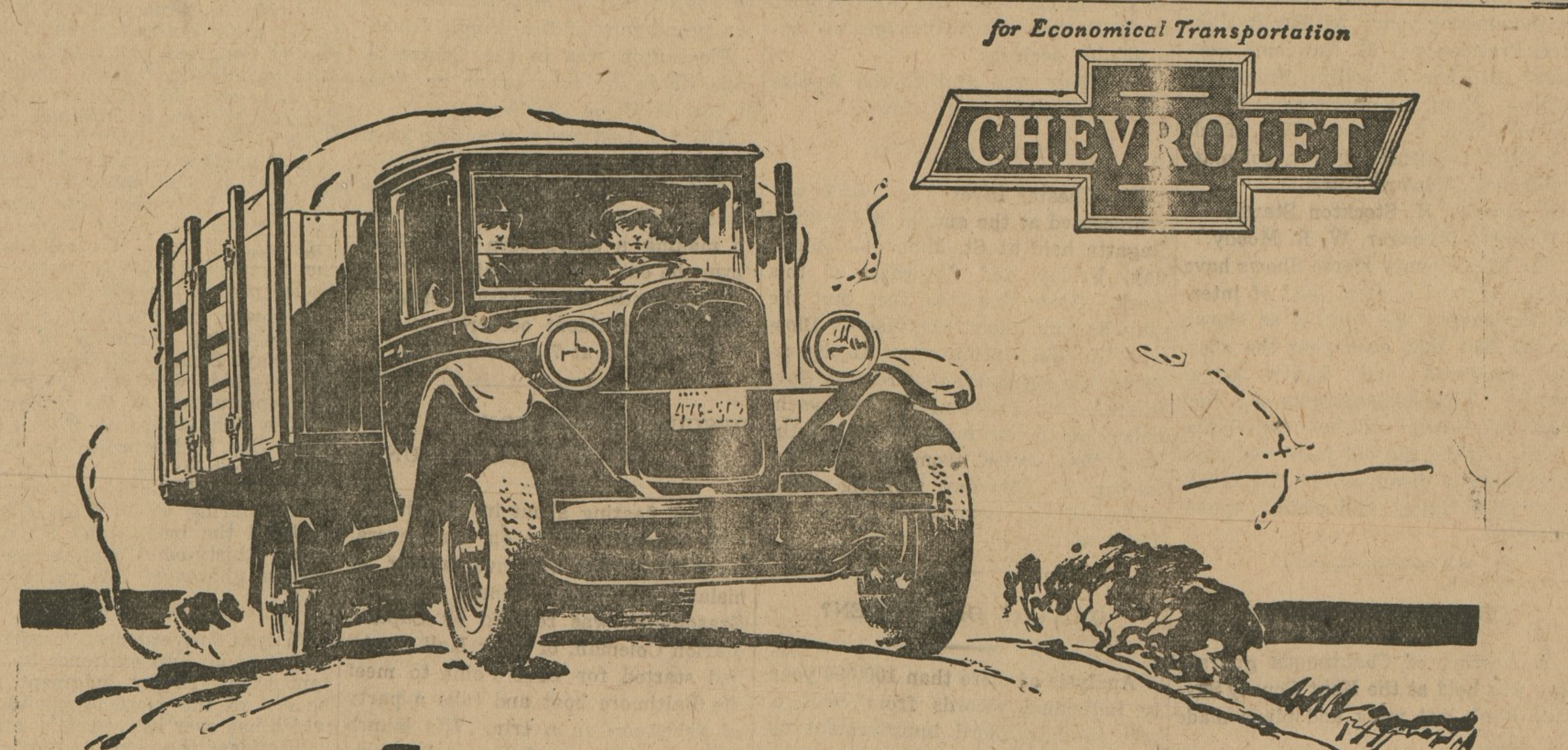

ORDER OF PUBLICATION
Charles Ferrell, Charles Ferrell, Administrator of Richard Dudley, deceased.
William Dudley, John Dudley, Mary Dudley Hicks and Serena Ferrell and the unknown heirs of Richard Dudley, deceased.

In the Circuit Court for Kent County, In Equity, No. 3257.
The object of this suit is to procure the sale of a small lot of real estate located in the town of Millington, in Kent County, State of Maryland, of which Richard Dudley, late of said Kent County, deceased, died seized and possessed, to pay the balance due on his funeral expenses amounting to \$57 and interest thereon, due said Charles Ferrell, and the expenses of administering his estate due said Charles Ferrell, Administrator, as well as the debts of all other creditors of the said Richard Dudley, who will come in and contribute to the costs of this suit.
The Bill of Complaint recites that the said Richard Dudley died about the month of February A. D. 1925, intestate in said Kent County, without personal property sufficient to pay his debts, funeral expenses and the costs of administration, that the Plaintiff, Charles Ferrell, paid the balance due for the funeral expenses of said Richard Dudley amounting to \$57 and took an assignment thereof that as chief creditor he applied to the Orphan Court for said Kent County for Letters Testamentary on the Estate of Richard Dudley and that such letters were granted him and due notice was given to creditors of the said Richard Dudley to file their claims duly authenticated against said estate, but that there was not sufficient personal property of said decedent to pay his debts and costs of administration of his estate but that the said Richard Dudley was the owner at the time of his death of a lot of real estate located in the town of Millington in said Kent County containing about 2 acres of land, and that the Plaintiffs pray that on account of the insufficiency of his personalty that said real estate be ordered by this Court to be sold to pay the debts and expenses of the administration of the estate of the said Richard Dudley.
That the only persons now having an interest in said real estate are the above named Defendants, William Dudley and John Dudley, residents of the City of Philadelphia, State of Pennsylvania, Mary Dudley Hicks and Serena Ferrell, residents of said Kent County but if any unknown heirs they are prayed to be proceeded against as against non-residents of the State of Maryland.


