GOVERNOR RITCHIE

SAID IN A SPEECH "We are tolerant enough to believe that a Catholic may be good enough to get to heaven, let us be tolerant enough to believe he may be good enough to be President."

In the speech Governor Ritchie said: "I am an Episcopalian. Why should any one believe that the Presidency would ever change him?"

DREXEL WINS FROM W. C.

Washington College, although playing good football, was unable to cope with Drexel last Saturday afternoon and dropped the football game here by the one-sided count of 26 to 0.

Drexel had the heavier line and a superior brand of aerial work, while the passing of Washington was faulty all through and with its attempts to break through the Drexel line frustrated at every point the losers were kept on the defensive all the way after the first quarter.

There was no scoring in the opening period, both teams playing evenly all through. Usilton featured the session by catching a forward pass and running 35 yards to be downed on the 20-yard mark, but Washington lost the ball shortly after and with it went its big chance to score.

Drexel broke loose in the second period and scored a pair of touchdowns when Grace and Cordoni both carried the ball over on plunges after it had been worked into scoring distance by a series of short passes.

Short Passes Deadly In the third frame Maschal and Heckman scored after the ball had been worked down the field in practically the same way. Drexel had its short passing game working smoothly with Washington trying vainly to break it up.

During the final quarter neither team was able to show to advantage. The ball went up and down the field much the same as in the opening period. Drexel was content to play safe and Washington's attempts to batter a hole in the line failed.

RABBIT FEVER

With the rabbit season opening in a few days, Dr. R. H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health, advises handlers and hunters to be on guard against sick or infected animals, carriers of the disease known in some parts of the country as "deer fly fever."

Three cases of rabbit fever were reported to the State Department of Health during the first six months of this year, one each from Washington, Talbot and Kent Counties, and four from Baltimore City. There were probably others, Dr. Riley said, that were not recognized as "tularemia." First discovered in California, in 1910, the disease has since that date been reported in 39 states and also in Japan. In this country, New York, Delaware, the New England States, Washington State, and Wisconsin, are the only sections in which it has not been observed. About 500 cases have been reported with 20 deaths. The disease occurs principally among wild rabbits. It has not been found among rabbits raised in rabbitries. Thorough cooking of the meat destroys the germ. Thoroughly cooked rabbit is accordingly harmless.
