KENT ISLAND CANAL APPROVED BY BILL PASSED THIS WEEK

Suspending the rules, the Maryland Senate on Wednesday adopted the bill which authorizes the Claiborne-Annapolis Ferry Company to cut a canal through Kent Island. The bill was favorably reported and advanced from its second to its third and final reading in the Senate.

Construction of the ferry canal across Kent Island would materially reduce the time between the Eastern and the Western Shores of Maryland. The bill also authorizes the Queen Anne's County Commissioners to establish ferry lines across the canal or to build bridges to take the place of any roads which would be intersected by the proposed canal.

CHURCH HILL CITIZENS VOTE LINE SALE

Sale of the light and power line and other equipment, constructed about five years ago by the taxpayers of Church Hill, to the town of Centreville for \$15,000 has been formally approved by the Public Service Commission of Maryland.

Announcement was made last week that the taxpayers of Church Hill would vote on the proposal Thursday, April 4. The election was held in the store of Harry E. Walls, in Church Hill, between the hours of 1 and 4 p. m.

Praise Plans For Sewerage Disposal Plant

The Commissioners of Chestertown were the recipients this week of a letter from the State Department of Health complimenting them on their stand for a sewerage disposal plant for Chestertown. The letter follows:

March 18, 1929. Commissioners of Chestertown, Chestertown, Maryland. Gentlemen:

I wish to express my gratification at learning that you have placed before the present General Assembly of Maryland a bill authorizing a bond issue for the construction of such work as may be necessary to collect the sanitary sewage of Chestertown and conduct it to a suitable point for treatment before it is discharged into the Chester River.

The discharge of untreated sewage into a stream is objectionable in all cases, but when its discharge point is along the waterfront of a town, it becomes a nuisance, not only as a health menace but as an offense to one's sensibilities.

In the last few years a rapidly increasing sentiment has developed throughout the entire country against the disregard shown for the preservation of the natural purity of our streams. Societies for the prevention of stream pollution are increasing in number. Conventions are being held to formulate programs for improving the situation. Agreements between states, similar to the one recently entered into between Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Maryland for the cooperative control of interstate waters are being executed; and at the time I am writing, the United States Public Health Service is conducting a school in Cincinnati, Ohio, for the training of stream-pollution investigators. To generalize, the signs of the day seem to point to a time at no great distance when rigid observance of stream pollution laws, which are frequently as at Chestertown, are intimately correlated with health laws, will be demanded.

The State of Maryland is awake to the danger to its sea food industry and to the health of its citizens and the citizens of other states, incident to the insanitary practice of discharging untreated sewage into the streams containing oyster beds. For this reason, until its efforts to correct the condition are realized, it is compelled to forbid the collection of oysters from certain valuable oyster areas.

The apparent indifference with which many communities seem to regard such obvious insanitary and unsightly conditions as are created by the discharge of untreated sewage into a stream makes the step that Chestertown has taken all the more commendable. If its plans are consummated, it will give Chestertown the distinction of being among the leaders in the movement toward better sanitation and more attractive water ways.

I am confident that the Legislature will authorize the expenditure, and I feel that the wisdom of your citizenry is a safe guarantee of its ratification at the municipal election. The project is one of health and the welfare of your town. It has no political or factional aspects. Its destiny is to be determined by a cultured and financially substantial community. It cannot fail of execution. Assuring you of my interest in this and all other problems pertaining to the sanitation of Chestertown, I am, Very truly yours,

A BUGLE CALL

All over the country, like a clear bugle call, the word has gone forth, for the first day of May to be celebrated as Child Health Day.

The thought first came from the American Child Health Association. Then it was taken up by every organization interested in any way in children. Even the Legislators in the Capitol at Washington, stopped long enough in their deliberations over the things at home and affairs abroad, to pass a resolution setting aside May Day as Child Health Day, authorizing and requesting the President of the United States to issue a proclamation inviting all agencies interested in child welfare to unite in observances that would direct attention to the fundamental importance of the nation's children.

The Governors of all of the States have given the plan their official sanction. Here in Maryland, where the day will again be dedicated to the children, their happiness and welfare, Governor Ritchie has issued a proclamation each year, sealing it with the Great Seal of the State, asking the people of Maryland to dedicate the day to the health and well-being of the children of the State.

Dr. J. H. M. Knox, Jr., Chief of the Bureau of Child Hygiene, of the State Department of Health, is Chairman of the Maryland Child Health Day Committee which is composed of representatives of all organizations interested in the health or welfare of the children of the State. "The real purpose of Child Health Day," Dr. Knox said in announcing the appointment of the committee, "is to focus the attention of the grown-ups on the right of the children and happiness not only on one day in the spring, but every day and all the year round. When the celebration of Child Health Day was first proposed by the American Child Health Association, President Hoover, then president of that organization suggested a 'Bill of Rights' for every child. It expresses the aims and hopes of every one who is working for the health of the children of our country.

Those interested are notified of the following requirements of the license law: If applicant's stock in trade does not exceed \$1,000... \$15.50 If over \$1,000 not over 3,500... 18.50 If over 3,500 not over 2,500... 20.50 If over 2,500 not over 4,000... 25.50 If over 4,000 not over 6,000... 30.50 If over 6,000 not over 8,000... 35.50 If over 8,000 not over 10,000... 50.50 If over 10,000 not over 15,000... 65.50 If over 15,000 not over 20,000... 80.50 If over 20,000 not over 30,000... 100.50

NEW LICENSE LAW Effective January 1, 1916
Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the License Laws of Maryland were amended by the General Assembly of 1916, and new sections added providing for the licensing of Detective Agencies and Agents, Moving Picture Shows and Carnivals, Garages, Cash Registers and Adding Machines, Typewriting Machines, Commercial, Mercantile and Mutual Protective Agencies, Intelligence Offices and Employment Offices, Laundries, Junk Dealers, Trading Stamp Companies, Wholesale Dealers in Farm Machinery, Soda Water Fountains, Livery Stables, Bowling Saloons, Storage Warehouses, Check Rooms, Dyeing, Cleaning and Pressing Companies, Shap-shining Parlors and Hat-Cleaning Establishments, Restaurants or Eating Places, Plumbers and Gas Fitters, Construction Firms or Companies, Non-Resident Wholesale Tobacco Dealers and Non-Resident Wholesale Liquor Dealers. For information of the license fees under this law apply to the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

STALLIONS—Any owner and keeper of every stallion or jack shall before being permitted to stand or station such animal pay to the Clerk of the Court of the highest county of the State the highest sum that he intends to receive for the season, for one mare, and the receipt of the said Clerk, with the seal of his court attached thereto for said sum shall be the license for standing or stationing such a stallion or jack for one year from the date thereof, provided that in no case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for such animal be less than ten dollars, and that every stallion or jack, upon which the said tax is levied, shall be exempt from all other State tax. Any owner or keeper standing or stationing any stallion or jack without a license shall forfeit and pay twice the sum authorized and required to be paid in the last preceding section one-half to the State and the other half to the informant as J. THOMAS HADAWAY, Sheriff.
