"PINAFORE" TO BE PRESENTED

The plot of the opera is attractively told in song and dialogue by a large cast of principals and a big chorus. The principal roles are to be sung by well-known singers from Chestertown and the surrounding counties, and the augmented chorus of male and female voices will be heard to splendid advantage in the melodious choruses of the opera. To hear the male chorus render the sailors' chorus "We Sail the Ocean Blue" as the curtain rises on the first act of the opera, is alone worth the price of admission.

One of the high lights of the evenings entertainment will be an especially introduced chorus of midshipmen, by a group of young misses. As no opera is complete without its ballet, an artistic offering, "The Ballet of the Hours" will be given by a large group of children ranging from tiny tots to the older kiddies.

The Washington College Orchestra under the direction of Dr. Livingston will accompany the production.

Rehearsals for the opera will start on Monday, April 29, and continue nightly until the nights of the production at the old Lyceum Theatre, Monday and Tuesday, May 13 and 14. The full list of names for the entire cast and chorus will be announced in a later issue of this paper.
