AWARD ROAD CONTRACT

George and Lynch, contractors of Dover, Del., were awarded the contract to build 8.3 miles of nine-foot cement road with three-foot shoulders of stone as a continuation of the road from Lynch to Fairlee. The bid was \$115,397.25.

Other bidders and their bids were: W. W. Truitt, of Lincoln, Del., \$135,820.50; Hannaman, Burris Co., Salisbury, \$125,158; Highway Construction Co., Selbyville, Del., \$117,729; Layfield and Waller, Salisbury, \$134,127.10; P. D. Phillips and Bro., Salisbury, \$119,516; Aelleo Construction Co., Rock Hall, \$119,817.10; Dual Marine, of Baltimore, \$132,896.

The bids were opened by the Commission in Baltimore. The total cost of the road, including material, will be approximately \$160,856.

CHAUTAQUA IS COMING

Guarantors of the Chestertown Chautauqua received this week programs announcing the events for the 1929 four day session here. The dates for Chautauqua are July 23, 23, 24, 25.

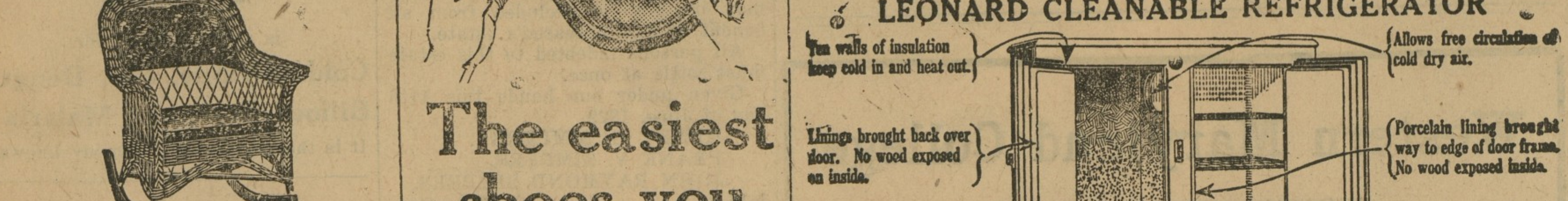
