Harrison W. Vickers, Solicitor. ORDER OF PUBLICATION Henrietta E. Bishop vs. James E. Bishop In the Circuit Court for Kent county In Equity, No. 2585.

The object of the Bill filed in the above entitled case is to procure a decree for divorce a vinculo matri- monii for the plaintiff, a resident of Kent County, Maryland, from the defendant, a non-resident of the State of Maryland. The Bill states: 1. That on the 17th day of April in the year 1922 she, Henrietta E. Bishop, was married to her husband, James E. Bishop. The said marriage took place in Washington, District of Columbia, and that after said marriage she resided in the City of Washington and in a suburb between Washington and Baltimore. That she lived with her husband about two years and that he deserted her some time during the month of June 1924. 2. That, though the conduct of your Oratrix towards her husband, the said James E. Bishop, always has been kind, affectionate and above reproach, the said James E. Bishop has, without any just cause or reason, abandoned and deserted her, and he declared his intention to live with her no longer, and that such abandonment has continued uninterruptedly for at least five years, and is deliberate and final, and the separation of the parties beyond any reasonable expectation of reconciliation. 3. That since their separation your Oratrix was compelled to make her own living and she took up nursing and maintains her home with her father, William C. Townsend, in Kent County, State of Maryland. 4. There has been one child born as result of said marriage namely, James E. Bishop, Jr., age six. 5. That since said desertion by the said James E. Bishop, he has failed to support her but does contribute towards the support of the child. Your Oratrix does not know the whereabouts of her said husband although she has been advised by some member of his family that he had left the State and is now in Miami, Florida, and that he is not a resident of the State. It is thereupon, this 29th day of August 1924, ordered by the Circuit Court for Kent County, in Equity, that the Plaintiff, by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in said Kent county, once in each of four successive weeks before the 30th day of September next, give notice to the said James E. Bishop, non-resident defendant, warning him to appear in this Court in person, or by Solicitor, on or before the 15th day of October next, to show cause, if any he has, why a decree ought not to be passed as prayed.
