
WEDDING IN HIGH CIRCLES

Florence Turnbull, daughter of Connecticut Governor, and John Coolidge, son of a former Massachusetts Governor and ex-President of the United States, was married in Plainville, Conn., late Monday in the presence of notables of New England and the nation. Two United States Senators, four former Connecticut Governors and the members of Governor Turnbull's military staff, were among those present at the ceremony, which took place in the village Congregational Church. The remainder of the guests were limited to friends and relatives of the Coolidge and Turnbull families. The nuptials, although colored by autumnal tints in decoration and bridal attire, were marked by New England restraint and dignity. Only 82 guests, seated in the center section of the little church, witnessed the services. The large delegation of newspaper men and photographers who have gathered for the event were excluded from the church, in keeping with the desire of the bridal pair to make the wedding "a quiet family affair." Two ministers officiated at the service. The Reverend Kenneth Welles, of Albany, former pastor of the Congregational Church at Northampton, Mass., and the Reverend J. Roy Wilkerson, pastor of the Plainville Congregational Church, and the single ring ceremony was used. A half hour's musical program was given while the guests assembled for the wedding. The March Triumph by Grieg, the prelude to Lohengrin and Elsa's bridal procession both by Wagner, and the Bach-Gounod Ave Maria were played on the church pipe organ by Professor William C. Hammond, of Mount Holyoke College from which the bride was graduated a few years ago. Just before the wedding march "Oh Promise Me" by Reginald de Koven was played by Professor Hammond and Emil Heinzerger, Hartford violinist, conductor of a hotel orchestra to the music of which Miss Turnbull has often danced. Then came the wedding procession—the bridal chorus from Lohengrin—as the bride entered the church on the arm of her father. Mendelssohn's wedding march was used as a recessional. Wear Old Ivory Satin Gown The bride, tall and blonde, wore a gown of old ivory satin designed in the slender lines of the princess silhouette. Her veil of old ivory tulle fell softly over her hair, ornamented by folds of duchesse lace, lent her for the occasion by Mrs. Coolidge. She carried a greatsheaf of white lilies, thus fulfilling a dream which she has had since a little girl.




