### REQUEST STATE AID

The board of directors of the Kent Upper Queen Anne's County Hospital through its chairman, the Rev. John White, rector of Old St. Paul's parish, has filed a request with the State Board of Aids and Charities that the proposed hospital shortly be erected in Chestertown shall be placed in a position to receive State aid for patients.

The request is conditioned upon completing and putting the hospital in operation prior to the assembling of the legislature in 1933. The board of directors several months ago purchased a location for the first unit of the hospital near Washington College and Henry P. Hopkins, architect, of Baltimore, submitted plans for a building.

Owing to stringent financial conditions and the serious effects of the drought especially in Kent county, the directors do not feel justified in awarding a contract for the erection of a building according to plans submitted which will cost close to \$60,000. The sum of \$42,000 was subscribed toward the erection of the hospital in a drive for funds early in the year, about \$27,000 of which is now in the hands of the treasurer, Senator W. B. Copper.

The location presents a beautiful view of Chester river and adjacent portions of the new development of the town. It is the intention of the board of directors to begin the building as soon as the situation becomes normal and plans which the architect instructed to submit.

### FOOT BALL IN HIGH SCHOOLS

The Board of Education decided to permit the playing of football in high schools of Wicomico county and laid down eligibility rules for players and candidates Tuesday.

The action will make possible the return of football which was discontinued in 1914, and in 1917 replaced by soccer. School officials expressed the hope that the schools adopting football would also continue soccer and engage in the annual State elimination games.

For many years there has been a contention among high school boys and many adults for the reinstatement of the most popular of all school sports. Outside of Baltimore, where it is the greatest of pastimes, football teams are organized at high schools in Frederick, Cumberland and Hagerstown.

Similar agitation has spread on the Shore and its adoption is expected in some of the other counties before the playing season starts next fall.

Eligibility rules formulated by the school board affecting all county players are as follows:  
1. Each student must have his parents' consent to engage either in practice session or in regular games.  
2. Students will not be permitted to take part in practice or in games
