The District Superintendent Rev. Johnson will preach here tomorrow morning and Rev. Hopkins will have charge of the evening service.

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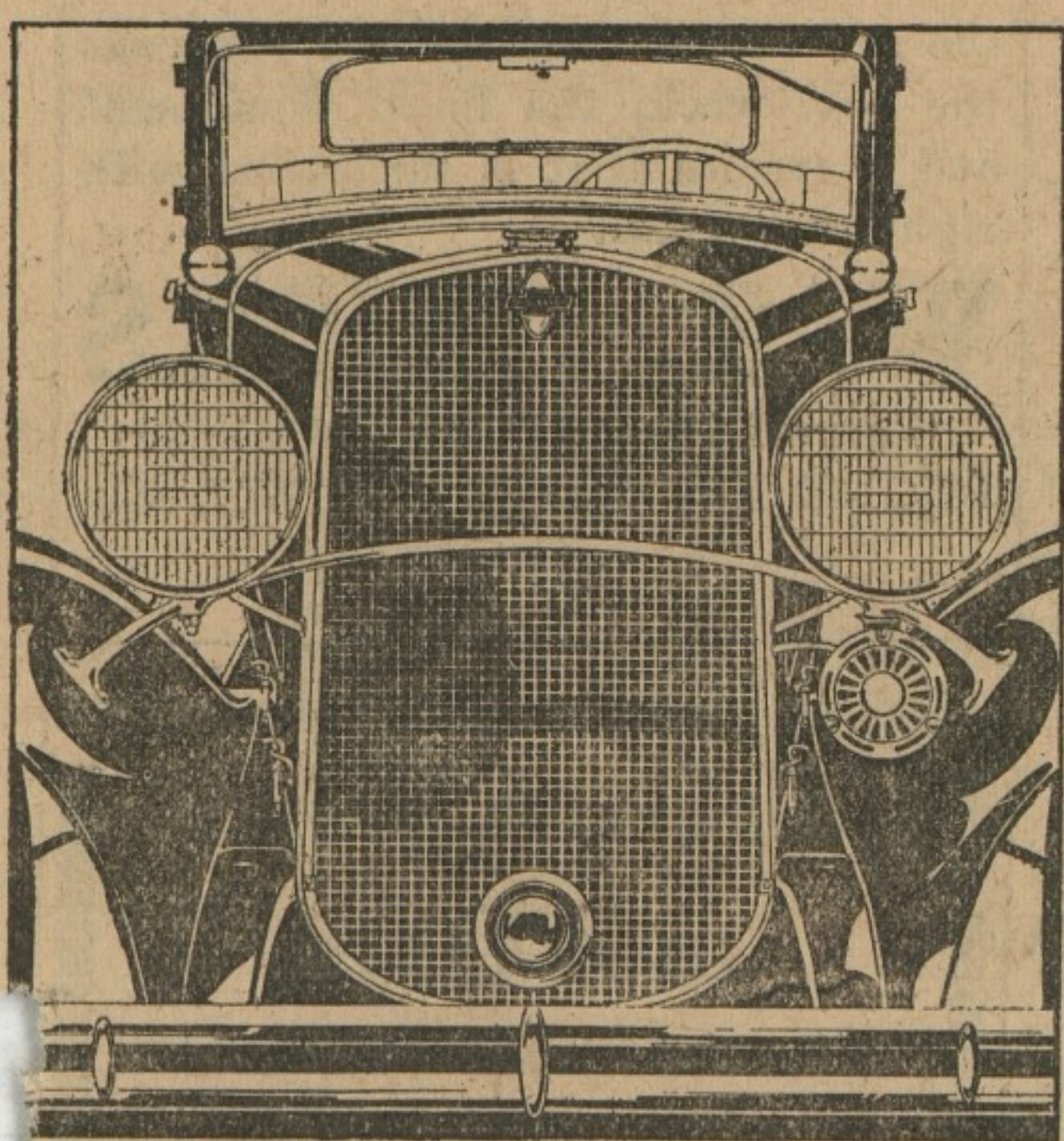
