REGISTRATION DAY ON SEPT. 2

Tuesday, September 2, will be the only registration day in Kent county prior to the primary election on September 8. All voters who are on the county poll books will be entitled to cast their ballots here on that date, regardless of their present abode.

Those who have moved into the county from other sections of Maryland six months prior to the general election, may obtain transfers from their former voting places to Kent. Those who have moved into the county from other states and who will have been residents for twelve months prior to the general election, also may register.

HORSES AS LOW AS \$2.50 EACH

The following shows the low prices of personality in New Market, Va. Recent auction sales of farm animals in this locality have reflected the acute shortage in hay and other forage crops resulting from the drought in Shenandoah and adjacent counties.

At a public sale held near here a few days ago six horses brought \$46. A two-horse team sold for \$6, while three other horses were auctioned off at \$2.50 to \$3 each. The sixth animal disposed of, a young horse, topped the sale at \$30.

While dairy cows were in better demand, they sold at low figures. With few bidders, cows brought from \$10 to \$25.

Household property in many instances has been auctioned off at prices less than its value for fuel. At the sale referred to walnut and oak beds sold at 10 cents each and other articles of furniture brought equally small sums.

GUNNING SEASON OPENS SEPT. 1ST

The open season for the hunting of Railbirds is September 1st to November 30th, inclusive, says State Game Warden.

It is unlawful to hunt squirrel or dove in the counties of Baltimore, Harford and Howard except between November 10th and December 31st inclusive. It is unlawful to hunt squirrel or dove in Allegany or Garrett counties except between October 1st and November 9th, inclusive. It is lawful to hunt squirrel and dove in all other counties except those named above, September 1st to September 30th, inclusive; closed season October 1st to November 9th, inclusive; then open season November 10th to December 31st, inclusive.

Bag Limit. Railbirds, 25 per day. Squirrels, 10 per day. Dove, 25 per day.

During the years of 1928 and 1929, nuts of all species and acorns were scarce in the majority of the counties of the State and squirrels annoyed our farmers by taking to their corn fields in quest of food. However, nuts and acorns are more plentiful this season than they have been for the past two years and we have not received complaints from the farmers that the squirrels were destroying their corn crops.

Due to the extreme drought which has prevailed since early spring and which at this time still prevails, unless rain comes to remedy conditions before September 1st, it would be very inadvisable for the sportsmen of this state to hunt squirrel or dove in the counties where the law permits hunting of these species September 1st, as hunting during extreme dry periods is very dangerous to forests and fields and serious fires are likely to occur. Maryland has been visited by the most serious forest fires in its history. The early forest fires, especially those during May, destroyed thousands of ground nesting birds and game animals. However, reports from all sections of the State are to the effect that game is plentiful in our covers.

We sincerely hope that before September 1st arrives, Maryland will be blessed with bounteous rains, eliminating the danger of the fire menace and assuring the sportsmen many joyous days afield.

LEAPS TO DEATH AS PARACHUTE FAILS

Walter Jewell, 35, of Philadelphia, crashed to his death Saturday night in the residential section of Denton when the parachute with which he made a leap from a balloon, failed to open.

Several thousand spectators, including Jewell's eight-year-old son, watched him hurtle to his death from a height of more than 1,000 feet. Firemen, at whose carnival Jewell made the leap, cared for the body until it was shipped to Philadelphia.

Residents of the town cared for the bereaved boy.

The dead man was in the balloon branch of the aviation service during the World War. Since the war he has been giving exhibitions and was said to be expert in parachute leaps. His wife is also a balloonist. It is said that the parachute used by Jewell was a new one, and that it did not successfully measure up to the standard requirements during its first test with a sand bag. It was found clenched in his hand, unopened. There was another parachute in the balloon.
