**MIDDLETOWN PAPER IS 62 YEARS OLD**

Thomas S. Fourke, owner and publisher is to be congratulated on the special edition issued last week in observance of the 62nd anniversary of the founding of the newspaper. The paper has 24 pages of advertising and interesting news, including a history of the newspaper and news items taken from the first issue:

The first issue of this newspaper came out on January 4, 1868, and was published and edited by the late Charles H. Vanderford. It was sold to Edward Reynolds in 1873, and he, several years later, sold it to W. Scott Way, nationally-known writer and humorist. Mr. Way disposed of his interests to Alexander and John Moreau, the latter now dead and the former the present owner of the Freehold. N. J. Transcript. William P. Mifflin, the next owner, sold it after a short while, to Abram Vandegrift. He sold the periodical to M. B. Burris and the late Hugh C. Browne, who in turn sold to McKendree Downham. The present owner and editor, Thomas S. Fourke, has managed the affairs of the publication for the past 32 years. A. Claude Fourke is associate editor, and Jennie I. Gallagher, secretary and treasurer.

The paper was originally published in a hand press in the basement of a building on West Main street. It has been in six different buildings since its establishment. Now it is printed on modern presses in a specially constructed building on that same thoroughfare.

**TWO GROUPS ARE SEEKING SUPPORT IN QUEEN ANNE'S**

With primary election day officially set for Monday, September 8, two virtually complete Democratic Factional tickets are afield, seeking the suffrage of Queen Anne's county voters in the approaching battle of ballots.

One group of candidates endorsed and nominated by the Democratic Organization was announced nearly two weeks ago, as follows: The second ticket made its appearance Saturday, endorsed by the Anti-Organization element and changing its name at the last moment from the "People's Party" to the "People's Democratic Organization."

Realizing the strength of the Democratic Organization throughout Queen Anne's county a frantic last-minute effort was made to appropriate the name of "Democratic Organization" in order to confuse uninformed voters and with the hope that such confusion might lend strength to their movement.

Leadership of the new anti-organization movement is reported to be placed in the hands of J. Louis Rhodes, of Queenstown, for many years active in county politics.

Two weeks ago, at an open meeting in the County Court House, which was attended by nearly 300 prominent and influential party workers, citizens and taxpayers, the Democratic Organization ticket was nominated and endorsed with spontaneous enthusiasm.

For several weeks the anti-organization element has been at work on a ticket and several meetings have been held. At these gatherings, however, a full ticket failed to materialize, and on Tuesday several leaders met and completed the endorsements. No announcement was made concerning where the ticket was made or who had participated in the making.




