ROAD DAY COMMITTEES BUSY

Weekly meetings are being held on Thursday mornings at 10:00 o'clock, at the Kent County Chamber of Commerce for the committees in charge of all affairs for Road Day and Homecoming Celebration which is to be held in this county on May 26. M. deK. Smith, Jr., is general chairman. The committee chairmen are as follows: Publicity Committee, Mrs. Nell C. Westcott. Program Committee, Dr. Paul E. Tittsworth. Tour Committee, A. Sydney Turner, Jr. Grounds Committee, Conlyn E. Noland. Reception Committee, Harry C. Willis. Entertainment Committee, J. D. Maxwell, chairman; Mrs. Wm. L. Fowler, vice-chairman. Decorating Committee, S. L. Dorf. About two thousand invitations are being sent to State and County officials of Maryland and State officials of Delaware, Pennsylvania and Virginia. Governor Ritchie will be the chief speaker of the occasion.

The price paid for the 443 acre farm bordering the Chester river near the site of the Chester River Yacht and Country Club, two miles southwest of here, owned by Harry Clay Brown is said to have been \$45,000. The farm is the scene of a colonial residence, dating to pre-Revolutionary War days, over 200 years old and has been tenanted by members of the Merritt family since its erection. The present tenant is Alfred C. Loud who, with his family, has lived on the farm for fifty years. His father lived there for many years.

Senator S. Scott Beck, acting as counsel, bought the estate, acting, it is said, for New York purchasers. It is reported that Col. Hiram Staunton Brown, of that city, former resident here and now president of the Radio-Keith - Orpheum Corporation and president of the board of governors of Washington College, is the real purchaser of the property.

It is further said the two mile waterfront part of the estate will be transferred into a bungalow, suburban residential colony for city dwellers. Several years ago all the valuable boxedwood on the estate was sold by the owner for Mr. Hammond, Jr., of Bordentown, N. J., who transplanted the ancient wood on an estate which was once the residence of Jerome Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon and husband of the former Betty Patterson, of Baltimore, when he was in this country. This fine riverside estate which originally included several farms is named "Gauldington Manor" and is a part of a large tract conveyed to one named Michael Miller in a grant from the English government. It has had but few owners—Miller, Merritt, Wilkins, Brown. Mr. Loud and sister will remain on the property for the present.

The wedding of the well known Worton merchant, Charlie C. Ivens, and Miss Mildred Rash, the attractive daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Rash, took place in Elkton Wednesday. They are now at their home in Worton where their friends gave them a hearty welcome.

KENT COURT IS NOW IN SESSION

The Circuit Court for Kent County began its April sessions here Monday morning with Associate Judge Lewin W. Wickes presiding. Chief Judge William H. Adkins was present later in the week. At the session on Monday morning the jurors were drawn and Thomas W. Perkins, of Chestertown was made foreman of the Grand Jury. Other members of the Grand Jury are: T. C. Cruikshank H. C. The case of Prince E. Edwards, charged with assault and battery, which was appealed from Olin B. Stafford, was tried before the Court on Monday. The plea was not guilty. Verdict was guilty and fine was \$10 and costs.

In the case of LeRoy Rochester, charged with disorderly conduct, the verdict of the Court was guilty. The fine imposed was \$1 and costs. The case was appealed from Charles R. Kerr.

John C. Money was found not guilty by a jury in the case appealed by the State in connection with the death of Jacob Crowding in an automobile accident to a car which was being driven by Money.

A case from Queen Anne's county, a civil suit brought by Harry Callahan against Edwin Brown was tried before a jury. Verdict for Callahan for \$75.00.

Rossvell Maith was convicted of breaking and entering storehouse of Pennsylvania Railroad. Wm. Elias was convicted of stealing turkeys from Wm. H. Mahan. Sentenced to 10 months in House of Correction.

Lewin Brown was convicted for stealing turkeys from Mr. Mahan and sentenced to 10 months in House of Correction. Thos. Williams was convicted of stealing shoes from Mr. Fox and sentenced to six months in House of Correction.

Joe Brinkley was convicted of breaking in J. Dempsey's house at Still Pond. Wes. Wilson pled guilty to stealing an auto tire from Chas. Porter and sentence was suspended.

Albert Comegys was convicted of murder in second degree and sentenced to ten years in penitentiary. Comegys killed Wm. Maddox in Chestertown early this year. The fight occurred over a colored woman.

The Grand Jury finished their work Thursday after four days of hard labor. They reviewed 40 cases, examined 109 witnesses, found 23 true bills and dismissed 13 cases. They recommend that the jail be overhauled and modernized. Also that the Legislature be asked for a bond issue with which to enlarge the court house and make better equipment possible in all departments. Conditions are congested in offices and vaults should be remedied.

The Grand Jury for Kent County adjourned Thursday after an arduous four days. They acted in a wise manner in their deliberations and are to be congratulated upon their work. Their recommendations are very important and should be carefully considered. Wether Ken County is able to put over another bond issue at this time is to be weighed seriously before being adopted.

The report also recommended that an act be passed in Legislature making petty larceny a misdemeanor so that such cases can be disposed of by a magistrate and not crowd dockets of Circuit Court thereby saving expense. A pleasant incident occurred in the session of the Kent County Grand Jury on Wednesday when Mr. Liston Pennington, of Millington, a member of the Jury was presented with a beautiful bouquet of flowers in honor of his 71st birthday. The news of his birthday was learned in an accidental way and this surprise effected.

The case against Will Waters for assault with intent to kill Officer Jack Jester November 2, 1929, was called for trial at ten o'clock yesterday. He is represented by George L. Pennington, a colored lawyer from Baltimore who in addressing the Kent County jury called it the "cream" of the State. S. R. Collins is representing the State.

Sheriff Hadaway has been harassed for months by friends of prisoners passing food, etc., from the outside. The climax came Tuesday night when some one from the outside gave liquor to the prisoners and caused some commotion. Sheriff arrested one man from trespassing in the jail yard and warns the public against this practice.

The first woman lawyer to appear at the Kent bar was Miss Helen Sherry who was here this week defending Mr. Schmidt, of Rock Hall, in a boiler suit against W. C. Sutton.

One of the most interesting civil suits to be heard will be a \$25,000 damage suit against Wilmer F. Davis of Denton, which was removed here from the Cecil County Circuit Court last year and heard at the last session of the local courts. The jury disagreed and the case was dismissed.

The suit arose out of an automobile accident several years ago, in which a car proceeding from Philadelphia south on the duPont Boulevard in Delaware, collided with a truck owned by the defendant. Miss Vera Martin, 16-year-old girl of Washington, D. C., was severely injured and later lost one eye. She was also permanently disfigured. Her mother, Mrs. Anne Martin, is bringing the suit. Similar suits, several of them for lesser amounts, are being brought by other persons who were less severely injured in the crash. They were all passengers in the automobile. Other plaintiffs are Miss Laura Mae Schurr, Elmer Schurr, Jr., Elmer Schurr and Mrs. Florence Schurr of near Philadelphia. State Senator S. Scott Beck and Robert Carman, former U. S. District Attorney of Maryland, are counsel for the defendant; F. R. Owens, of Denton, and Harrison W. Vickers, of Chestertown, are attorneys for the plaintiffs.
