MR. HARRINGTON'S ARGUMENTS

The arguments of Emerson C. Harrington, former Governor of Maryland, against the proposed Chesapeake Bay Bridge might carry more weight if Mr. Harrington were not president of the Claiborne-Annapolis Ferry Company.

Although everything that had been hoped for was not achieved, the London Arms Parley has been an emphatic success. The five great powers, the United States, Great Britain, Italy, France and Japan, finally reached an understanding and Tuesday a compact ratifying it was signed.

Japan, Great Britain and the United States have come to an agreement covering limitation and reduction of naval craft, while all five powers are agreed on such points as humanization of submarines and capital ship holiday. Important French-Italian limitation differences, however, are left unsettled, being subject to subsequent negotiations.
