NOTICE TO FISHERMEN

This is to advise you that Chapter 180 of the Acts of 1929 provides a closed season on the catching of black bass in tidal waters. The Act became effective June 1, 1929, and a copy of same will be furnished upon application to the Conservation Department, 516 Munsey Building, Baltimore, Md.

The Act provides that it shall be unlawful to take bas sin any manner in tidal waters during the months of April, May, June and July, or to sell, offer to sell, purchase or offer

to purchase, or have i npossession this species of fish during the above named months whether the fish are caught in waters of this State or brought here from the waters of another State. It also makes it unlawful for a private or a common carrier to transport same during these months.

Those fishing in tidewater by means of rod, hook and line during } the open season following are limited to the catching of twenty bass in any one day and also prohibited from catching or having in possession any bass less than ten inches in length.
