KILLED GOING FOR DOCTOR

A fatal accident befell two of Worton's young men as they were hastening to Chestertown Wednesday for medicine for their ill grandfather. Harry Cooper was critically ill at Worton Station and John Money, aged 21, and Jacob B. Crowding, aged 31, grandsons, started in Mr. Money's car to town for medicine. As they turned the corner at Hopewell, near Chestertown, and entered the boulevard they collided with Guippe's big moving van, of Baltimore.

Mr. Money, suffered broken legs and internal injuries. Following first aid treatment by Dr. Simpers he was carried to the Easton Hospital in the Kent County Ambulance where he died at 11 p. m. Wednesday.

Mr. Money, suffered cuts about the face and his car was badly wrecked. The Chestertown-Elkton road is a boulevard and all traffic from intersecting roads, of which the Worton road is one, is supposed to halt before entering the main thoroughfare. There is a stop sign at this intersection. Officer Carl Strom, local member of the Maryland State Police Force, is investigating the mishap in an attempt to place the blame.

Mr. Crowding is a son-in-law of Sheriff J. Thomas Hadaway, and leaves a widow and two children. Mr. Money is a son of August Money and a recent graduate of the Chestertown High School. The driver of the truck was not injured.

Mr. Crowding's funeral will take place at his late home in Worton Station at 10 a. m. this Saturday interment in Chester Cemetery; C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

55 DRY LAW CASES TRIED

The third year of the Federal Court at Denton was held this week. There were 55 cases on the docket nearly all for violating the local option law.

Thirteen prison sentences, including one of fifteen months in the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., were imposed Monday morning. Judge Morris A. Soper.

In addition to the prison sentences two fines were imposed. James Wittington, of Kent, charged with manufacture and possession, was sentenced by Judge Soper to the Federal Prison at Atlanta. He has a previous court record and has been arrested several times.

The other sentences to be served in county jails, follow: Thomas J. Williams, possession and maintaining a nuisance, three months; Leonard Pinder, transportation and possession, three months; Arthur J. Sharp, manufacturer and possession, for months; Franklin P. Morris, Jr., manufacturer and possession, four months; Charles Heton, manufacturer and possession, four months; Fred Smith, possession and sale, thirty days; Joseph Rueger, manufacturer and possession, three months; Reynolds McCready, manufacturer and possession, six months; Charles Hickman, manufacturer and possession, three months; Jay Bolden, possession and maintaining a nuisance, four months; Marion T. Ross, possession and previous record, seventy-five days, and Dick Duty, possession, two months.

Alvin T. Bratton, charge with possession, was fined \$50 and Debb Gudzeur, also charge with possession was fined \$400.

A charge of manufacture and possession against Maud McCready was dismissed.

Tuesday, January 21 More than a score of cases involving alleged violation of the prohibition laws were disposed of by Judge Soper here today, on pleas by the accused. One juror was unable to agree and another was deliberating when court was adjourned for the day.

The jury which heard testimony against Dan Eisner, charge with the possession and sale of liquor and was discharged by Judge Soper. No date was set for a second trial of Eisner. The panel which heard the case against Harvey Lord, of Williamsburg, charged with possession.

Cases disposed of were: Charles T. Jarrell, manufacturer and possession, five months in jail, and Melvin Crew, charged with him \$300 and costs. Both are from Kent county.

George H. Filkins, Worcester county, manufacturer and possession, four months in jail.

William I. Reid, Somerset county, manufacturer and possession, \$500 and costs.

Herman W. Smith, possession and maintaining nuisance, four months in jail. The case against Rudy Wilson, charged with him, was not pressed. The case was from Somerset county.

Alfred R. Dryden, possession, six months in jail, and Thomas Dryden, possession, not pressed. Both cases came from Worcester county.

John V. Bell, Jr., possession, three months in jail; Mary Wise, possession, three months in jail; Jas. Sterling, possession, five months in jail and Edward Way, two charges of possession and one of transportation, six months in jail. All four were residents of Cambridge.

James Boston, possession and sale—Somerset county, five months in jail. King Adkins and Edward Adkins, both of Worcester county; possession, manufacture and sale, four months in jail.

The cases against Elbert M. Cook and Ada Cook, charged with possession, were not pressed, and Henry Cook was sentenced to three months in jail on the same charge. The cases against the three were brought from Somerset county.

John W. Jarrell and William Williams, Queen Anne's county, manufacturer and possession, five months in jail, Williams being paroled.

Clifford Brittingham, Cambridge, manufacturer and possession, six months' suspended sentence and paroled for two years.

On Wednesday sentences were given in three cases which had gone to trial. John T. Lockwood getting five months, and Linus Gordy three months on charges of manufacture, while thirty days was the sentence of Louis Pollett on a selling charge.

In cases in which pleas of guilty were entered, William P. Seward was sentenced to three months on a manufacturing charge, and Nathan Roy and James Poth were fined on possession charges.
