CONGRATULATIONS, EASTON

The reduction in the rate for electricity, recommended by the Easton Utilities Commission to the Mayor and Council, is conspicuously interesting. It is the result of plans made and mostly put into execution by the Commission more than a year ago. The new rate is made possible by the installation of additional generating units that produce current at a rate cheaper than heretofore, and this installation was recommended by the Commission after mature thought and after several years' observation of the operation of similar machinery. Easton is now about to receive the cheapest electric rate of any town in Maryland, but not so cheap that the income may be used for further improvements as may be demanded by the constantly increasing demand made on the plant. Residential service rate is 8, 6 and 3 cents; \$1.00 per month minimum. Commercial rate is 8, 6, 3 and 2.7 cents according to quantity.

THE PRESIDENT'S FINE REPORT

The annual report of President Paul E. Titsworth, of Washington College, for the past 12 months, which has just been published, shows a flourishing condition both financially and also from the standpoint of growth.

In the report of Business Manager James W. Johns, which is appended to the president's report, the gross income of the institution for the year 1928-29, including what are known as budgeted and unbudgeted items was \$113,522.27, while the total budgeted expenditures amounted to \$95,688.02. The report shows that more than \$60,000 has been expended during the year in improving the boys' dormitories and in remodeling Reid Hall. The total enrollment for the year has reached 269, which is the greatest number of students that can be accommodated with the present equipment. Of the total enrollment 166 are men and 103 are girls.

Out of the total enrollment, 205 students are members of some church while there are 64 non-church members. President Titsworth states that all departments of the institution are functioning with greater efficiency than at any time in the history of the institution, while the needs of the student body are being provided for by the broadening of the college curriculum and by an increase faculty.

The report of Graduate Manager Fred W. Dumschott gives total receipts from the various sports activities of \$10,132.15, as against total expenditures of \$9,220.60. The Athletic Association also has a checking and savings account of \$5,449.34.

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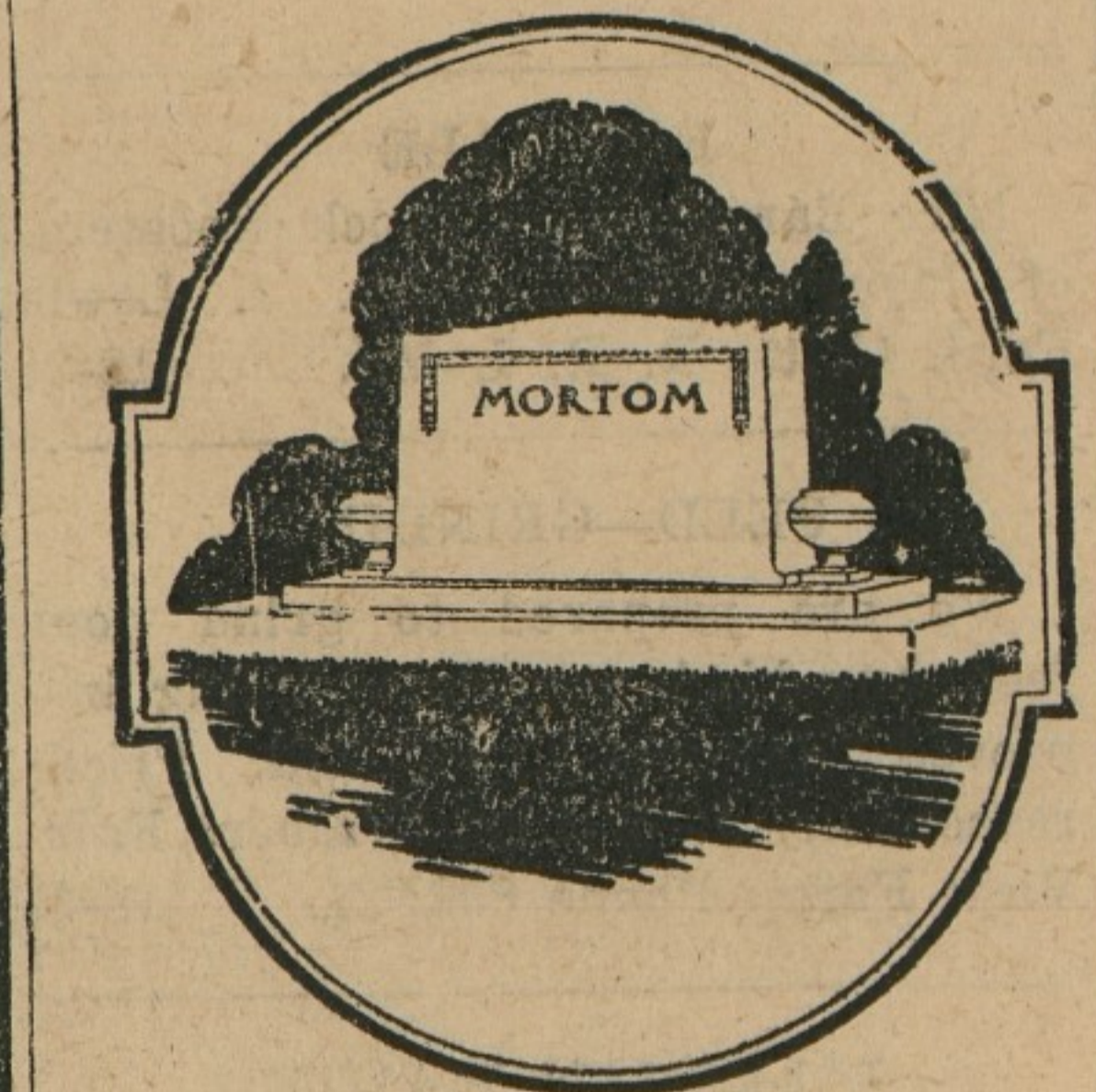
