KILLED STARLINGS
Charles B. Nicholson, a young farmer living three miles from Chestertown, is making an effort to raise a large crop of late potatoes.
In order to keep the vines in prime condition, he sprayed his entire tillage one day last week with a strong insecticide to rid the vines of potato bugs, which threatened trouble. The farmer not only killed all potato bugs in sight in his patch, but he was agreeably surprised a day or two after spraying the potato vines to find 150 dead starlings lying among the potato vines.
Whether the birds had gorged themselves on the potato bugs which had eaten the insecticide or beat the bugs to the poison is not known, but the farmer not only rid his potato patch of bugs, but did a good day's work for himself and neighbor farmers by killing the starlings which had made serious inroads on corn fields.
Large flocks of starlings have been playing havoc with corn in many fields throughout the county.

WHIPPING POST FOR BEATING HIS WIFE
Clarence Bell, forty-year old carpenter, was sentenced Thursday by Judge Bailey in Wicomico Circuit Court to thirty lashes to be delivered before noon Friday for beating his wife.
This is said to be the first use of the whipping post in Wicomico county and such penalty is legal only for wife beating, to which Bell pleaded guilty.
The Judge pounded the bench before him while severely censuring Bell and in delivering the sentence said that he wanted him to remember the beating for thirty years, a lash for each year.
To Sheriff G. Murray Phillips fell the duty of administering the sentence but he delegated it to deputy sheriff Charles Truitt.
Bell was also fined \$100 for driving a car while under the influence of liquor and \$20 for striking his mother-in-law.

A BIG GAME HERE TODAY

One of the largest crowds to witness a game in the Chesapeake Bay League this season is anticipated on Washington Field here today when the Church Hill and Kennedyville clubs will battle it out for the seasonal pennant.
Each team has won a game and this will be a great game. Miller will be on the mound for Kennedyville and that warner, B. Loller, for Church Hill. Game called at 2:45 P. M.

LOLLER WINS FINE GAME
Bill Loller was in his prime Wednesday at Kennedyville, nor was Andy Miller able to stop the hard-swinging Church Hill nine. The visitors earned a 9 to 2 victory over Kennedyville in the second game of the Chesapeake Bay League championship series.
The tilt was called in the seventh because of rain. This ties up the three-game series and necessitates a final set-to on the Washington College diamond at Chestertown this Saturday.
The visitors opened the scoring in the second inning when Loller, Brown and Clough singled. Loller scored on the last hit and Brown came home on Jarvis' long outfield fly. Clough raced home when R. Walls hit a circuit out.
Kennedyville's scoring attack came in the fifth when Orley singled and scored on Smith's double. Winter hit to the infield and in the sixth to catch Smith at third, C. Walls dropped the ball and the runner crossed the plate. Loller hurled a steady game for the visitors, holding Kennedyville to four scattered hits.

Heavy swatting won Kennedyville a hard-earned victory over Church Hill in the first tilt of the championship series in the Chesapeake Bay League. The score was 9 to 7.
While both pitchers were hit freely, neither Miller nor Loller were in good control and the outcome depended on the artillery. Hurlock knocked in four of the winners' runs.
In the fifth frame Miller pulled him self out of a bad hole, when, with the bases loaded with local runners, he fanned two batters and caused another to send up a fly.
The local club started strong the third inning, when Hickman and Russell singled and Epstein beat out a punt, filling the bags. The bases cleared when C. Walls doubled, and came home as Smith dropped Brown's liner to short.

The winning runs were scored in the eighth when, with two down, Hodgson sent a grounder through Hickman's legs and stole second, scoring when Kern singled or threw in to the plate and scored on Archibald's double.

GASOLINE will shortly be brought by boat from Philadelphia, down the Delaware and Delaware Canal and down the Chesapeake bay to the new pier now under construction on the Chesapeake river, half-a-mile south of this town. The pier will be 500 feet long. The four tanks on the pier will have a capacity of 359,350 gallons.

TWO months after a metal tag had been attached to the fin of a rock by Dr. John C. Pearson, assistant aquatic biologist, U. S. Bureau of Fisheries, who is studying the migration and spawning habits of fish in the Chesapeake Bay, the fish was caught at Rock Hall. It was sent with a consignment of fish to a Baltimore fish dealer, who discovered it, and reported his find to State Game Warden E. Lee LeCompte.

THERE have been two new cases of typhoid fever discovered at Pond-town in Queen Anne's, making 19 in all. The epidemic started among a family in Pondtown using well water believed to have been polluted by surface water, and the disease was communicated by contact with other persons.

CAUGHT AT LAST

Trailed through four States Michael Welch, 26-year-old escaped convict from the Maryland House of Correction, is back again at the institution after having been captured by Sheriff John T. Vickers and Deputy Sheriff Ellsworth Whaland, of Kent county, at the request of State authorities.
Welch, whose home is at Golt, 18 miles northwest of here, was sentenced to serve six months on a charge of wife beating by Magistrate Robert Moffett here last month but he took French leave last week. The sheriff was notified and made a raid trek to Smyrna, Del., Philadelphia, Camden, Haddonfield and Collingswood. He found Welch in a house in Penn's Grove, N. J., and was arrested with the aid of New Jersey officers and brought back to the local jail from which he was transferred to the House of Correction. He was convicted of wife beating in the local court.

263 ENROLLED AT COLLEGE

Class exercises began at Washington College Monday morning, following Freshman Week program. The largest freshman class in the history of the Shore institution, numbering 61 men and 32 women students, began their college career.

There are also a larger number of new students in the upper classes than for several years past, bringing the total enrollment at the beginning of the fall term to 263, which is the largest September enrollment in the history of the college. The following new members of the faculty appeared since the close of the last year, assumed their duties:
Professor Frank Goodwin, instructor in economics; Professor Paul A. Solandt, instructor in modern languages; Dr. Kenneth S. Buxton, head of the department of chemistry and science; George Ekaitis, assistant coach in football and director of lacrosse, and Dr. Kathleen E. Carpenter, head of the Department of Biology.

President Paul E. Titworth believes that the institution will enjoy the most successful year in its history. During the summer vacation the athletic field has been reconstructed to conform to a new program of athletic sports, the dormitories have been renovated, and a concrete walk built from the boys' dormitories towards the athletic field.

MEMBERS of the freshman class are being put through the usual hazing stunts as girls parade the streets of this college town with stockings for hats and in variegated costume and boys parade with signs pinned on their shirts signifying that "I am a rat." Some reports of cruelty in hazing is reported but the faculty are giving more supervision to this conduct than ever before. Large colleges have discontinued the practice entirely. Wouldn't it be wise for all schools to follow suit?

Wilbur Ross Hubbard, a member of the Chestertown Rotary Club, addressed that body at its weekly meeting on Monday, telling of a recent trip to Europe, during which he visited Rotary clubs in several different countries. A one hundred per cent attendance was recorded at the meeting.

Next Monday the speaker at the Rotary session will be S. E. Perkins, 3rd, who will talk on different phases of bird life.
