#### BANKERS MEET AT CENTREVILLE

The second annual meeting of the bankers of the Fifth Maryland District, which embraces Kent, Queen Anne's, Caroline and Talbot counties, was held at the Centreville Hotel on Friday evening.

State Senator Dudley G. Roe is president of the district organization and W. Robert Huey is secretary-treasurer. Thirty-one banks in the four counties were represented at the meeting.

Problems affecting the welfare of the banking institutions in the district were discussed.

### NEED FAITH IN GOD TO END ILLS

"The fundamental danger confronting the nation today is not the depression, which is bound to end some time, but the fact that the youth of America, in their quest for education, are losing the old, simple faith in God, the life hereafter and the immortality of the soul."

That was the statement yesterday of Frank A. Furst, Baltimore captain of industry, political leader and millionaire contractor, who pointed out his remarks with a thrilling story of his own experiences as a Civil War Soldier in the Battle of Antietam.

Mr. Furst added: "The question of 'What is America coming to,' or 'When is the depression going to end' is impossible to answer. My own personal idea is that we still have further to go into the valley."

"But the comforting thing is the abiding faith of our people, especially our humbler ones, in the fundamental facts of God, the life in another world and the immortality of the human soul."

"In these days of unemployment, of want and privation, they would not continue to live if they did not have this faith. It is this faith which recasts our ideas as to the value of money, of possessions of creature comforts."

"If I had a million neckties I could wear only one at a time. Possessions often are of more joy for their owner to give away than to keep or use."

"I am nearly eighty-six years old and I have come to feel this way about money—what I spend I have had; what I save I will lose; what I give away to others I shall take with me when I go."

"No, America need not fear depressions, which will end, but rather should fear things that are beginning."

"I refer to the overanxiety of the American youth to educate themselves out of the simple faiths."

"Fathers have come to me and said:

"Mr. Furst, I have sent my son to Harvard, or Yale, or Princeton, and he has come back to me an atheist. He believes not in God, nor in the life hereafter, nor in the immortality of the soul. He tells me, 'Dad, I would love to believe, but I just cannot.'"

"But the time will come when he will have to, and may it come soon! 'It may take a war. The World War brought it to some. I recall an incident of my Civil War service that pointed it to me that there is an inscrutable Power."

"It was in the battle of Antietam. General Hooker had been shot as near to me as across this room. My chum and I had talked about the battle early that day, before the bullets flew as thick as hail."

"His name was Yorker. I said to him:

"'Yorker, I have a premonition that my time has come. I feel I am going to get hurt today.'"

"I felt it so strongly that I gave him \$10, all the money I had."

"We were hiding behind a tree. Both of us were desperately hungry. Just beyond us stood a cracker box. How we wanted those crackers. But neither of us dared go out into that hail of shells and bullets after crackers."

"Finally we decided to go. I don't know why I should not have gone first, but he went. A shell burst."

"I picked myself up and looked for Yorker. He was lying over the crackerbox, his brains blown out—quite dead."

BEGINNING October 1st Easton Emergency Hospital will receive increased aid from the State. It has been receiving \$12,000 a year, based on the per capita of \$1.76 a day for free patients. Beginning October 1 the amount will be \$14,000 a year. The Miracle House also will receive \$6,000 a year instead of \$5,000, based on a per capita of 50 cents a day. Both of these institutions have more than earned the allotted amounts and work for which no aid is forthcoming from any source, or in other words at a considerable loss.

#### FIRE LOSS STILL HIGH

During the first half of 1931 the total estimated fire loss was \$242,568,267, as compared with \$242,299,771 for the same period last year.

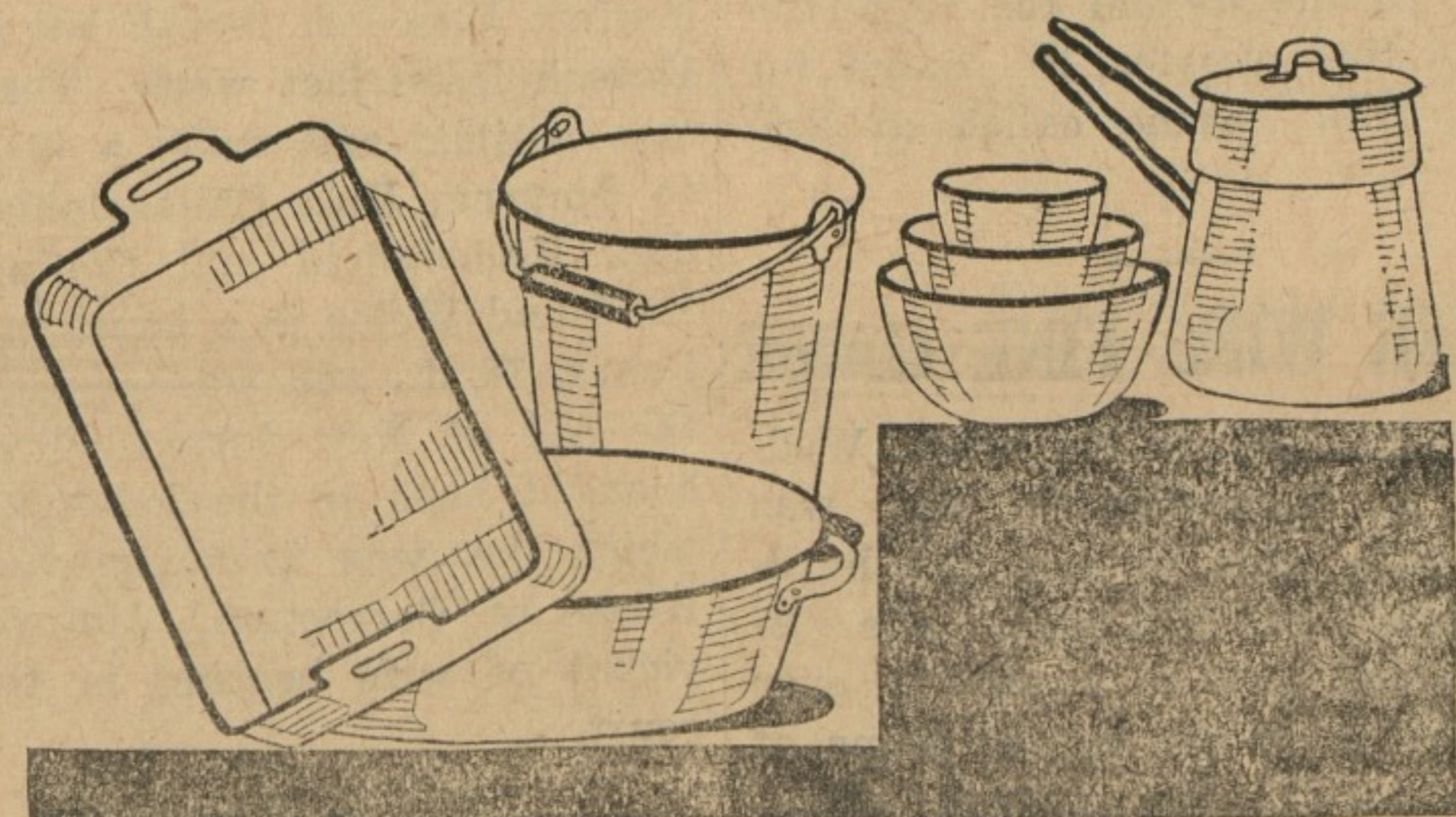
The increase is so small as to be almost negligible. But 1930 was a year of high losses, and we are continuing to hold the total to an excessive figure. Carelessness and thoughtlessness, coupled with arson, are still combating the fine work of those organizations, public and private, which are laboring to instruct the people in the fundamentals of fire prevention.

We have not yet learned, as a people, that it is better to prevent a

fire than to extinguish one. We may have the best fire department in the world—but every fire, no matter how slight, results in some waste. We may point out that there are few great conflagrations any more—but a few comparatively small fires can cause a waste of millions, not only in property damage, but in loss of business, employment and higher taxes for other property.

If the last six months of 1931 are like the first six, we will again approach the \$500,000,000 mark in destruction by fire. The fire records of past years are a series of black marks against our much vaunted American efficiency.

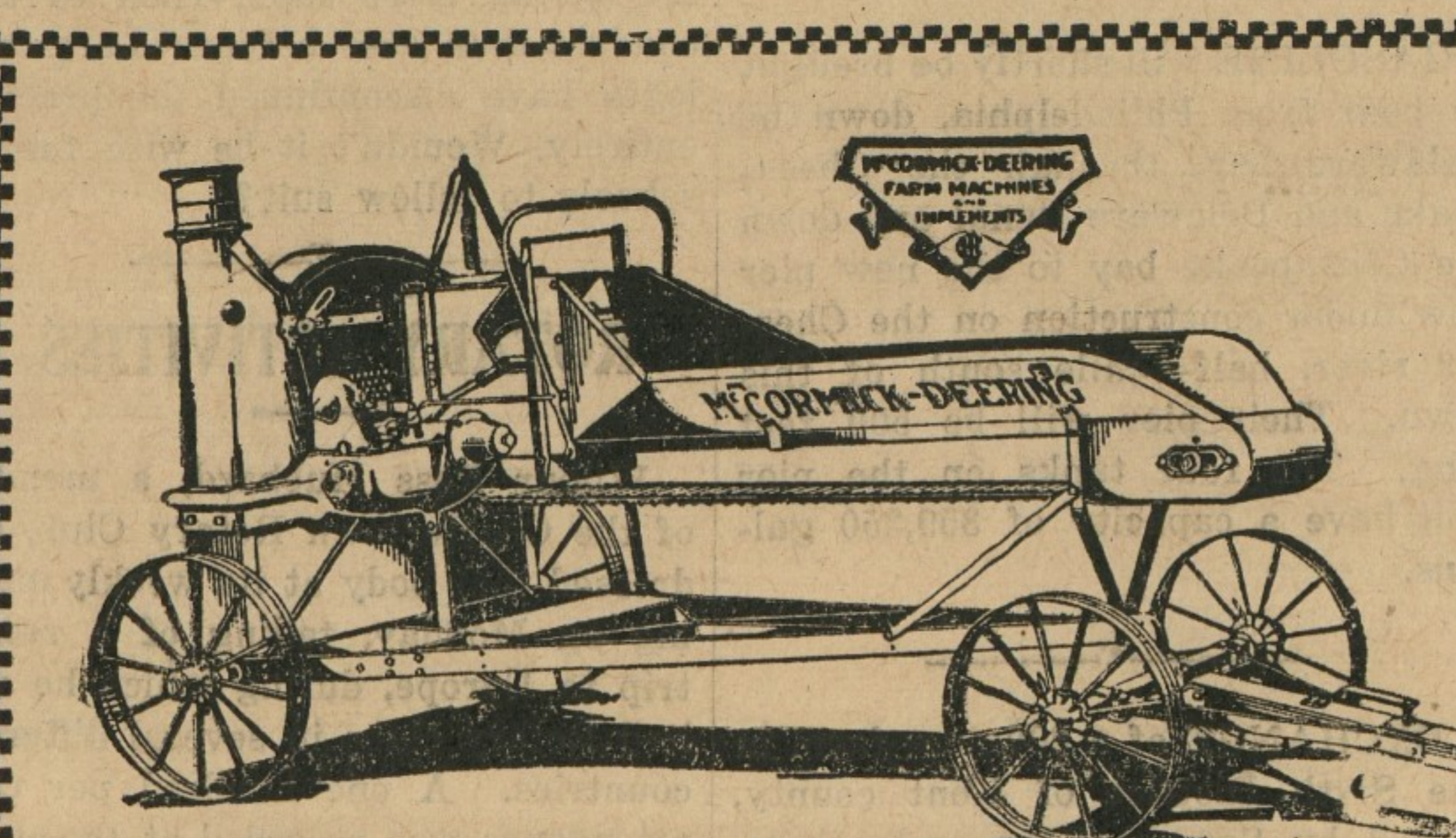


