NEGRO ATTACKED AGED WOMAN

Identification by Mrs. Florence V. Dashiels, 63, Stevensville, mother of seven grown children, as the man who forced his way into her home early Sunday morning and attacked her, William Reynolds, 32, Negro, is held in Baltimore jail.

Her sons and residents of the community, it is said, are incensed over the occurrence and authorities feared violence.

Mrs. Dashiels, who lived alone, is the mother of three grown sons and four married daughters, all of whom are prominent in various sections of Queen Anne's county, except two living in Baltimore. Her husband, James Dashiels, died several years ago.

Following the attack she was taken to the home of one of her daughters, Mrs. Charles Paca, on Kent Island, where she is under the care of Dr. Charles E. Snyder.

Sheriff J. Elmer Anthony was notified at 4 o'clock Sunday morning of the occurrence and, accompanied by Constable Louis B. Perkins, he left for Stevensville, twenty miles west of Centerville.

In the meantime Constable Hobart Kelley, of Kent Island, had been summoned and arrested Reynolds at the home of Mitchell Davidson, where he was employed as a farm hand. Brought to Centerville, Reynolds was confronted by Mrs. Dashiels, who identified him as her assailant. Reynolds denied the charge when questioned by the officers and State's Attorney William R. Horner.

Reynolds declared he accompanied Annie White, a Negro, to the home of John Peet, another Negro, about midnight Saturday night and remained there until daybreak Saturday morning, when he went to the Davidson farm to complete his morning chores.

The colored woman, to whom he was to have been married next week, denied his story, however, police say, insisting that he left the Peet home at 1.30 A. M. Her story was substantiated by Peet.

It was brought out that Reynolds received \$5 Saturday afternoon from his employer, that he gave his intended bride \$3 and then spent the remaining \$2 in liquor drinking at another Negro's home. Officers have the names of the men and women who attended this party.

Mrs. Dashiels told the officers that she was awakened and saw a man in her room smoking a cigarette. He warned her and demanded some money. Unable to comply with his demands, the Negro, Mrs. Dashiels said, choked her to almost insensibility and then attacked her. She had known Reynolds for several months because his work caused him to pass her house several times and he also had called several weeks ago to ask if she had any furniture for sale, she said.

Infuriated by the treatment of their mother, Allan and Spencer Dashiels, of Kent Island, pleaded for a chance

to avenge the wrong, but were persuaded to allow the law to take its course. Other citizens on Kent Island expressed indignation and after Reynolds was arraigned for a hearing, which he waived, officers removed him quickly to Elkton jail.

Neighbors who were summoned by Mrs. Dashiels as soon as her assailant left, notified the authorities, Chas. Willoughby, a next-door neighbor, answered her cries for help.

The sons and daughters of Mrs. Dashiels include Allan and Spencer Dashiels, of Stevensville; Roger Dashiels, of Baltimore; Mrs. Lillian Ewing, Mrs. Hattie Paca and Mrs. Florence Davidson, of Stevensville, and Mrs. Mabel Stevens, of Baltimore.

Reynolds said he was born in Baltimore and until ten months ago, was in the employ of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. He stated that after he was laid off he came to Kent Is-

land seeking work and that he had been employed on the farm of Mitchell Davidson. He denied ever having been arrested before and insists he has no knowledge of the crime.

The Dashiels family is one of the largest and best known on Kent Island. The aged woman is in a highly nervous condition.

Feeling is bitter on Kent Island and State's Attorney Horney said he will petition the Circuit Court to call the grand jury into special session to consider the case. He also will ask that a special session of court be held to try Reynolds without delay.

Bids On School Bus Routes

Sealed bids on the transportation of school children from the Cherry Lane and Morgneec school districts to the Kennedyville school building, Chestertown, Maryland, at its meeting to be held at 10:00 A. M., on Tuesday, June 30th, 1931. Those who submit bids should base them on the following requirements to be made of the one to whom the contract is awarded:

1.—A glass enclosed bus, new or in excellent state of repair, that will seat forty-five children allowing fourteen inches of lineal seating space per child, and equipped with cushioned seats.

2.—The bus must be equipped with a heater that will comfortably heat the bus in cold weather and the heater must NOT be attached to the exhaust pipe.

3.—Public liability insurance of \$5,000 and \$25,000 limits must be provided each year by the contractor.

4.—The route one way will be eleven to fourteen miles subject to adjustment by the Board of Education.

Sealed bids on the transportation of school children from the Turner's Creek school district to the Kennedyville school building, Chestertown, Maryland, at its meeting referred to above. Those submitting bids on this route should base them on the following exceptions:

1.—Under the first requirement, the capacity of the bus for this route is to be twenty-five children.

2.—Under the fourth requirement, the length of this route will be from four to five miles instead of eleven to fourteen miles.

The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
