With James G. Beck as foreman of the Grand Jury the April term of the Kent County Circuit Court convened here on Monday morning. Associate Judge Lewin W. Wicks and Associate Judge Thomas J. The Grand Jury finished its work Wednesday, a good record when the number of witnesses examined and cases heard are considered. Their report is as follows: To the Hon. Judges of Circuit Court: The Grand Jury of April Term beg to report as follows: We have been in session 3 days, examined 86 witnesses, made 61 pre-sentments and found same to be in good and sanitary condition with exception of toilet on second floor. We insist it be put in sanitary condition and floor repaired in a reasonable time; also install one light in toilet on first floor. We have interviewed the Sheriff and different officers in county, as to violations of the criminal law. The Grand Jury recommends that the necessary legislation be enacted at the next session of the Maryland Legislature to give Magistrates jurisdiction to try and determine petty larceny cases so as to save time and expense of Grand Jury and Circuit Courts. The Jury extends its appreciation to the Honorable Court, State's Attorney, Sheriff, Clerk of Court and all other officials for their courtesy and help extended to us during the session. BANDITS ROB BANK

Members of the State Police in both Pennsylvania and Maryland are seeking two hold-up men who robbed the Rising Sun branch of the Elkton Bank and Trust Company not long after that establishment had opened for business Tuesday morning and succeeded in making their getaway with over \$2,000 in currency. After compelling the cashier and his wife to sit on the floor the two men left the bank, entered an automobile across the street in which there was an accomplice and fled in the direction of Quarryville, Pennsylvania. Joseph Tyson, the cashier, and his wife were the only ones in the bank when the robbers entered and after refusing to cash a check for one of the men were held at pistol point and compelled to hand over the entire amount of cash in the drawers and then commanded to sit on the floor until the two men made their escape. Approximately \$3,000 in the safe was overlooked by the robbers in their hurry to get away.
