HARD FIGHT ON PURSE NET

Following a prolonged and heated hearing on the anti-purse net bill by the Senate Fish and Game Committee this week, the committee indicated that the measure will be reported out this week.

The bill, called by its proponents "a preserver of Maryland's natural resources," and by its opponents a bill to make the Chesapeake Bay "a rich man's game preserve," was recently passed by the House of Delegates.

At the hearing attended by approximately 300 persons, Senators Beck, of Kent county; Withgott, of Talbot, and W. Mason Sherman, of Eastern, attorney, assailed the measure as designed to work hardships on fishermen.

The measure was supported by Myer Rosenbusch, president of the Maryland Sportsmen's Luncheon Club and member of the Isaak Walton League, and Ralph C. Sharrett, executive secretary of the Public Improvement Commission of Baltimore.

At the close of the meeting it was forecast that the bill will be favorably reported.

In opposition to the bill, Senator Beck said:

"If one conviction for violation of the purse-net laws in the last ten years can be produced, or if it can be shown that any fish caught by this method have been used for fertilizer in the last twenty-five years, or if it can be shown that there are any less rockfish in the bay than in 1920, I will vote for the measure."

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DUCK SEASON SHORTENED

Hundreds of Kent duck hunters doubtless will be surprised to learn that new Federal regulations have been promulgated apparently without any wide-spread knowledge on the part of sportsmen, which shorten the shooting season in by exactly sixteen and one-half days.

Under the new amendments to the Migratory Bird Regulations, approved March 17 by President Hoover, the season here is shortened from November 1 to January 15, instead of from November 1 to January 31. Shooting also is prohibited until noon of the first day of the season.

TO AWARD TRIP TO STATE 4-H WINNER
The most outstanding 4-H home economics club girl in each state of the Union will be eligible to receive a prize educational trip to the Twelfth National Boys and Girls 4-H Club Congress at Chicago next December. It is announced by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. The 1931 winners of these awards will be selected from 500,000 rural girls. During the summer months they will be busily engaged in baking, canning, sewing, meal planning and home furnishing projects under the supervision of the extension services of the United States Department of Agriculture and their State Agricultural Colleges.

These trips to the National 4-H Club Congress are offered by Montgomery Ward and Company and will be awarded in recognition of outstanding achievements in home economics projects and to encourage further 4-H Club activities. This is the eighth consecutive year such prizes have been offered.

Approximately one and a quarter million dollars is annually awarded in prizes to 4-H Clubs, the membership of which is rapidly approaching the million mark.
