

Weather Sharp Foster's Discouraging Prediction and His Reasons.

A YEAR OF STORMS.

Beginning with the first week in May of

this year, and ending with the last week in June, 1892, will constitute the greatest storm period since 1832-3, and it will be at it's greatest force during the coming winter. The winter will set in early, and with its usual cold and great snow storms and blizzards will be what is termed a very For County Taxes due and unpaid . hard winter. These winter storms will begin in the northern tier of states with great severity in October, and an early winter, very severe all over the continent, will follow. The force of the storms will not be so marked as those latter on. We will, probably, have an occasional tornado, but destructive storms will not attract general attention till after June 8, when the great battle of the elements will begin in earnest, and every month will begin its No. 12-James A.
