Short Hints about Cholera. Upon this now all-absorbing topic the Philadelphia Times publishes the following

"Cholera is quite unlikely to appear in this country in epidemic form. The lateness of the season and the vigilance of the quarantine unite to forbid it. "If isolated cases of cholera were to appear in any of our cities, there would be no well understood; and even if epidemi cholera were to break out, there would be fewer deaths than from a like epidemic of vellow fever, scarlet fever or small-pox. "There would be very few deaths from genuine Asiatic cholera in this country but for the fact that so many who are taken with cholera, or think they have been taken with it, persist in making suicides of themselves. Nine-tenths of the fatal cases

of cholera in this country are the direct result of sudden prostration by fright. "With our climate and general knowledge of cholera, nine-tenths of all cholera patients should be saved from death, and when properly treated, that proportion would be saved if the patient did not precipitate death by fright, The peril in cases of cholera is the collapse of the physical system, and terror collapse ten cases to one

"True, the strongest and the most prudent may fall victims to cholera as they may to any of our many fevers, pneumonia or other maladies; but the common idea that an attack of cholera means death should be rejected by every intelligent person. There are diseases about us all the time which are equally if not more dan-

"Cholera needs timely precaution and prompt treatment. By common-sense care there is reasonable safety from cholera even equipment for business life. Also French and German.
