Loss by Fire.

Cornelius J. Scott, Esq., of Galena, met with a very heavy loss by fire Saturday afternoon. About five o'clock Messrs. Wilson & Davis set their engine and thresher on the stack yard and were about to commence threshing wheat from the stacks, near by. The stacks were not properly arranged and compelled the engineer to set his engine close up to the stacks. This did not suit Mr. Scott so the engine was moved further away. Mr. Wilson assured Mr. Scott that there was no danger at that distance and work was begun. About ten bushels of wheat had been threshed when Master Bertie Ireland detected fire at the bottom of one of the stacks. Strenuous efforts were made by Mr. Scott and others to smother it, but in vain, and in a few minutes fourteen stacks of wheat were ablaze. The whole was consumed, loss about \$900. Messrs. Wilson & Davis lost their thresher which they estimated at \$400. There was no insurance on anything. It is supposed that the fire originated either from the sparks from the stacks or from a pipe.
