Alfalfa as a Crop.

The cultivation of Alfalfa has been con-

sidered as a crop in Kent recently. It has for years been discussed by the agricultural journals of the country, and farmers in various parts of the nation have tried it with varying success. In California it is a highly important crop, and is relied upon is now being tried in Delaware, and some of the farmers over there are very confident that it will pay largely. The Smyrna Times, in a recent article on the subject, has this to say in behalf of the crop:
Alfalfa is unquestionably the most desirable food plant that grows. The difficulty is in getting it started, but when once a "set" is obtained, the farmer has a prize.
