

It shall not be lawful for any person to keep any

Be it enacted by the General Assemoly of Maryland, That from and after the passage of this Act it shall not be lawful for any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties to carry on the days of election, secretly or otherwise, any gun, pistol, dirk, dirk-knife, razor, billy or ludgeon, and any person violating the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, on refusal to pay said fine shall be committed by such Justice of the Peace to the jail of the county SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That the fines colcollecting the same to the School Commissioners of the county where such offence shall have been committed, for school purposes, SECTION 3. following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24, AN ACT Prohibiting the sale of Spirituous or Fermented Liquors in the counties in the State on the day of SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or other places where liquor is sold, or for any person or persons directly or indirectly to sell, barter, give, or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of election hereafter to be held in the several countries of the Se held in the several counties of the State.

SECTION 2. And be it enacted. That any person riolating the provisions of this act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall upon and every offence; one-half the fine to be paid to

Commissioners for the use of the public roads.

Betting on Elections. The attention of all persons is particularly called to the following sections ef Article 35, Code of Public General Laws of Maryland: SECTION 46. No person shall make any bet or wager on the result of any election to take place in SECTION 47. Any person offending against the last preceding section shall be liable to indictment in the Circuit Courts, if the offence be committed in any county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, if the offence be committed in Baltimore; and on more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the School Fund, Section 48. Every deposit of money in any part of the State as a wager or bet upon elections in this State or elsewhere shall be forfeited and paid over
