The following Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at the January Session of 1874, and approved April 6, 1874, is published for the information of the public: o prevent the carrying of guns, pistols, dirks. dirk-knives, razors, billies or bludgeons by any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties on the day of election in said counties. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the passage of this Act it shall not be lawful for any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties to carry on the days of election, secretly or otherwise, bludgeon, and any person violating the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof by any Justice of the Peace, in either of said counties, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than twenty dollars, and on refusal to pay said fine shall be committed by such Justice of the Peace to the jail of the county SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That the fines colcollecting the same to the School Commissioners of the county where such offence shall have been committed, for school purposes. SECTION 3. And be it enacted, That any constable of either of said counties, or the sheriff thereof who shall refuse to arrest any person violating any provisions of this Act upon information of such offence, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof befor the circuit court of the county, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars, and shall forthwith be
