

In granting a charter for the bridge, the last Legislature specified that the State Roads Commission must pass upon its safety as a road-

way before construction may begin. John N. Mackall, chairman of the commission, said today that he is not at all satisfied with the projected fill as it is outlined on drawings exhibited at the hearings held last week by Maj. C. W. Pettis, district engineer for the War Department.

Major Pettis is now considering the proposal from the standpoint of the

Federal Government. The drawings show that the bridge builders plan to build up an embankment from the Miller Island end of the bridge more than two miles out over the mud flats and almost to the channel on this side of the bay. The blueprints, Mackall said, show nothing but sand being used in the em-

not a safe roadbed." Although he said it is outside of his jurisdiction, Mackall pointed out that the embankment also would be a hindrance to navigation by small craft.
