LONG IN NEW BRIDGE PLAN

Company Files Revised Specifications For Chesapeake Project

Providing a span with a horizontal clearance of 500 feet, believed sufficient to allow the passage of barge lines in the worst kind of weather, revised plans for the proposed bridge across the Chesapeake Bay were filed Friday with Major C. R. Pettis, War Department engineer for this

district. The plans also make other changes in the original proposals filed last summer with Major Pettis, but in all cases the revision provides greater clearance for vessels passing through or under the bridge.

W. Roscoe Bonsal, president of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Company, sponsor of the project, said the change in the plans met all objections from barge interests in Balti-

more and Hampton Roads. He said the changes would increase the cost of building the bridge several hundred thousand dollars and that they represented the most that could

be done. Philadelphia barge interests at recent hearings on the bridge proposals said they would not be satisfied with any proposal that did not include four 1000 foot spans across the two bay

Mr. Bonsal said yesterday that erection of such spans would increase the cost of the bridge by several milhibitive that the entire project would have to be abandoned if the War De-SEES have to be abandoned if the War Department insisted on such require-

The original plans provided for a draw over the west channel with a horizontal clearance of 165 feet and LAW one over the east channel with a horizontal clearance of 210 feet. The vertical clearance for both draws was

proposed at 135 feet. The first objections made to the bridge were that the draw over the west channel should be as great as that over the east channel. On the promise that this suggestion would be accepted the steamboat companies withdrew their objections, with
