BEGAN OYSTER HEARING IN BALTO. CITY COURT TUESDAY

To Be Continued Before Judge Owens Tomorrow

Hearing of the test case to determine whether the new statute requiring oyster packers to give the State one-tenth of their shells or the equivalent in money is constitutional began before Judge Albert S. J. Owens, in the City Court of Baltimore yesterday. Counsel for the packers argued that the measure was confiscatory of private property and counsel for the State Conservation Department contended that the ten per cent clause was merely an additional license fee.

The case will go to the Court of Appeals after a decision is given in the City Court, it is understood. Two hours of evidence from both sides was heard by Judge Owens yesterday before the hearing was adjourned at 5 P. M., to be continued at 11:30 A. M. tomorrow.

Objections Cited By Barge Company Must Be Removed Before Government Will Give Consent

Due to a deadlock over the size of draw necessary to permit the passage of barges, the Chesapeake Bay bridge project has reached what is regarded as the most critical stage of its development, it was learned Monday.

BAY BRIDGE MUST CHANGE PLANS TO BE PASSED BY U. S.

In an effort to end the deadlock over the size of draw, Stuart S. Janney, an director of the bridge company, with a group of Baltimore navigators, yesterday conferred informally with Major Pettis.

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While Major Pettis did not say definitely what effect the testimony given by these navigators had on any opinion he had formed in regard to the bridge, he intimated that he was yet to be convinced that the present plans were feasible.

The original plans for the bridge contemplated two draws, one 165 feet long over the west channel and another 210 feet long over the east channel. After the hearing in September the bridge company agreed to increase the length of the west draw to 210 feet and to increase the clearance of both draws when closed from thirty-five to forty-five feet.
