Sewer Ordinance

ORDANCE NO. 42 PASSED SEPT. 5th, 1927

Be it enacted and ordained, That all owners of property abutting the public sewer line of Chestertown and within a distance of 200 feet from said sewer line shall connect any residence, store or dwelling to said sewer for purpose of sewerage disposal of all privies or places where human excrement is deposited. That all persons failing to so connect with the sewer thirty days after written notice given them shall pay a fine of \$10.00, and every twenty-four hours after notice shall be considered a separate offense, said fine and costs of prosecution to be collected as pro-


