Noted Cowgirls, Champions of West, With Walter L. Main Circus This Year

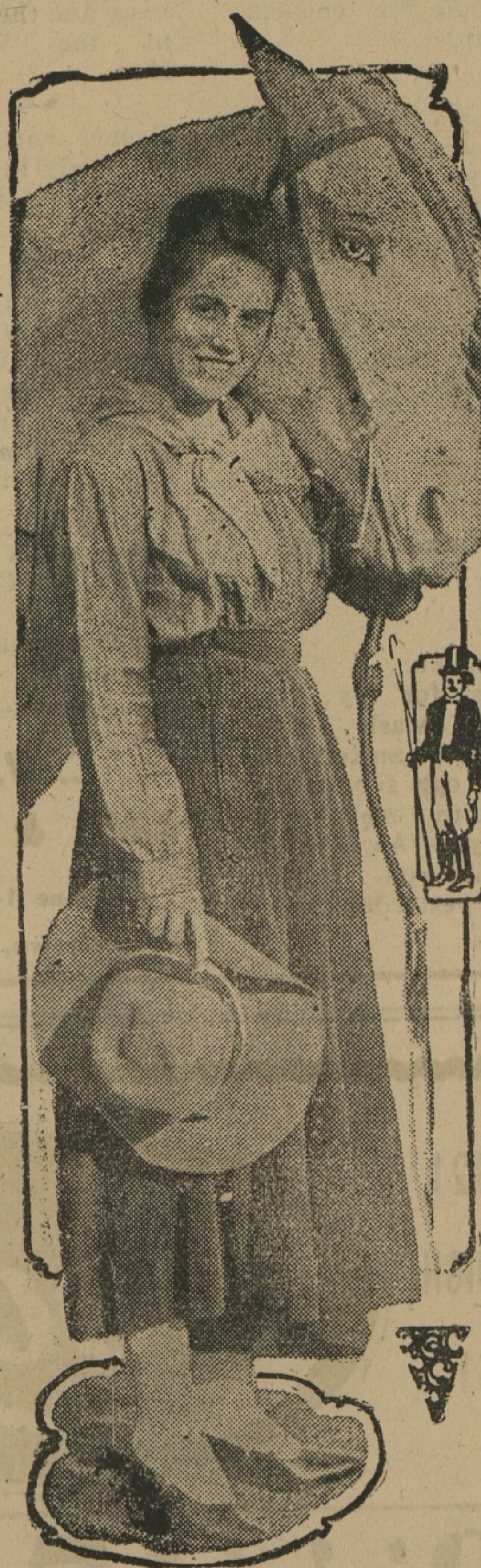

When the parents of the present generation were boys and girls there lived on the western plains a great body of hardy heroes who acted as guardians over the large herds of cattle which roamed the trackless plains.

Few of the original pioneers have survived. But those who have, love the traditions of the Far West with an unparalleled devotion and have instructed their offsprings in the arts of the pioneer days.

Each year the plainsmen celebrate in Cheyenne, Wyo., Calgary, Alberta province, Canada, Pendleton, Ore., Walla, Walla, Wash., and other places. Here the latest trick and fancy riding stunts are performed and the winners are awarded prizes.

However, the Wild West numbers by no means constitute the only feature of the circus program this season. There are 40 clowns, 30 acrobats, 40 equestrians, and 50 acrobats with the big show this year.
