Seven lives apparently have been lost in the effort to conquer the Pacific. Six men and one woman, all competitors in the Dole air derby, are missing and doubtless met the same fate as Nungesser and Coli, the two Frenchmen who were lost in the attempt to cross the Atlantic.

While the endeavor to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu was praiseworthy and required courage, the stake was not worth the cost in lives. Where two planes succeeded in flying safely to the Hawaiian Islands, three failed. The reason for the difference opens up a wide field for speculation.

The greatest sufferers from government competition at present are the small publishers and printers who cannot compete with the tax-free government owned printing plant which prints and sells return-addressed stamped envelopes. There is much agitation to discontinue this absurd but at the same time we see the country flooded with political propaganda to launch the government in other branches of industry. All such proposals are contrary to the true spirit of our constitution.

The fundamental point the American people must consider is not so much whether they want public ownership of some particular industry, but whether or not they want to change our entire form of government, the cardinal principle of which is a recognition of the right to private property and the development of private enterprise under government protection, to a system which does not recognize the right to private property and which would have the government step in and take over the various business enterprises which heretofore private citizens have had a right to operate.


