The best form of training will soon be determined.

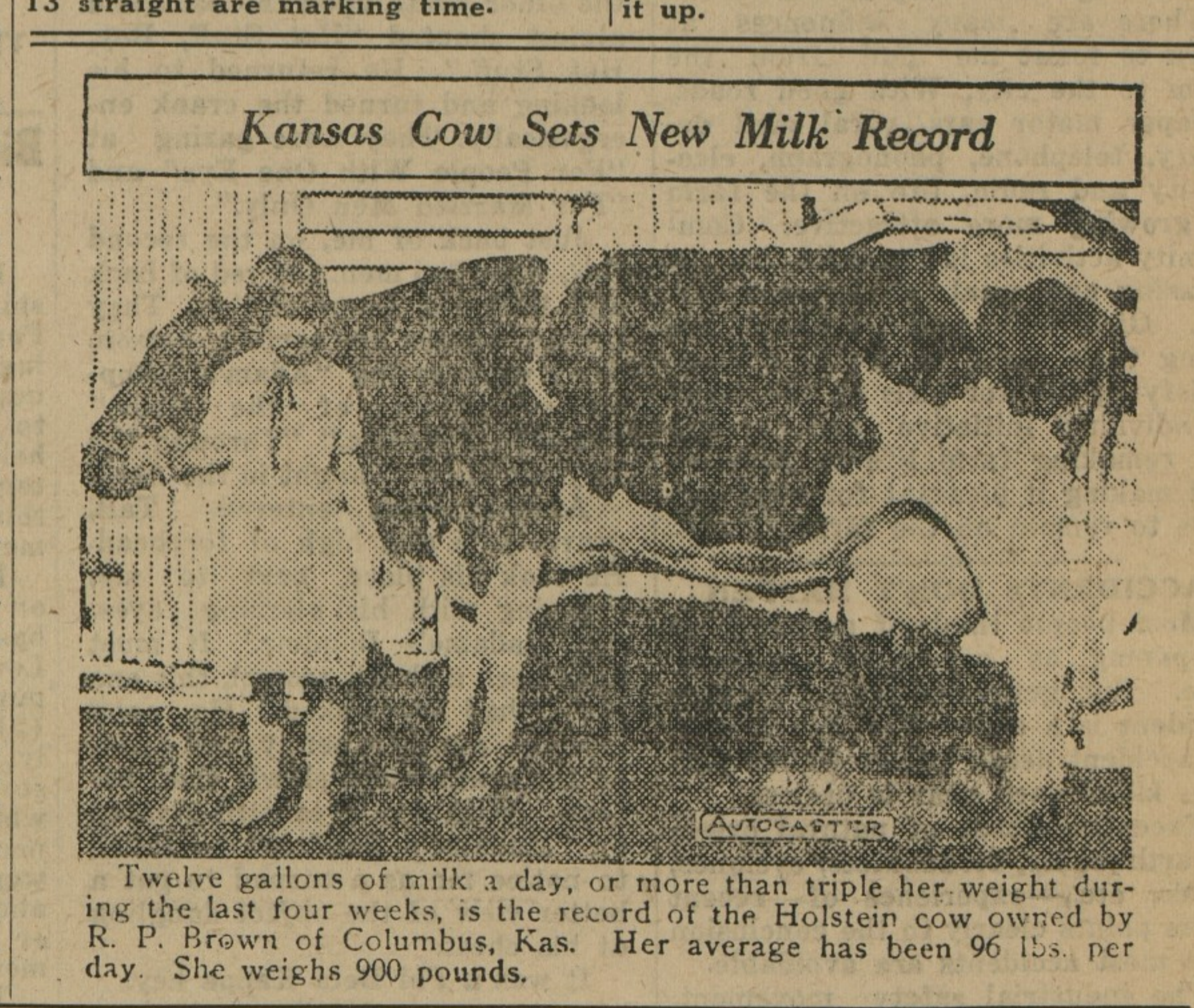
