Letters To The Editor

Baltimore Chamber of Commerce Office of the President Baltimore, Aug. 23, 1927. Mr. L. Bates Russell, Editor, The Enterprise, Chestertown, Md.

My dear Mr. Russell: The Baltimore Chamber of Commerce views with such concern the great prevalence of smut in the Wheat grown in Maryland and near-by localities this season that it feels that every possible effort should be made to eradicate this condition as promptly as possible.

With this end in mind we are asking your co-operation in our desire to impress upon our Farmers the importance of treating their seed wheat before Fall seeding.

We understand that the County Agents are prepared to render every assistance possible and also that the Farm Bureaus, in the several counties will be able to provide the material required for this treatment.

No farmer should plant this Fall without first treating the seed whether he had smut in his Wheat this year or not. The cost of treating this seed is most trivial compared to the loss to the Farmer in the reduced price he obtains for a crop infected with smut.

Inspections at Baltimore this year show that about 65 percent of this year's crop contains smut to an extent that cost the Farmers on an average of about 12c per bushel.

It is the intention of the Baltimore Chamber of Commerce to endeavor to secure the fullest co-operation of the State and Government authorities, which we now feel certain will be cheerfully given, so that if the Farmers can be convinced of the importance of the matter under discussion and will communicate with the County Agent, every assistance will be given them.

We trust that we may count upon your co-operation as the successful results of these efforts are primarily in the interest of the farmer.
