

#### Washington College Lottery Tickets Found

In looking over some old papers that had been in the possession of his family for years, Mr. Wilbur W. Hubbard, of Chestertown came across two lottery tickets dated 1784. The lottery for which the tickets were issued was known as the Washington College Lot-

tery, State of Maryland. The ticket calls for the holder to receive the amount drawn for that number less a discount of 15%.

The two tickets are on a single sheet of paper. A deed dated 1772, concerning a transfer of property within the Hubbard family was also found.
