Hagerstown Cops State Base Ball Championship Here

Maryland's baseball championship crossed the bay to the Western Shore Monday when Hagerstown, representative of that section, defeated...

The score was 6 to 0. It was a masterly pitching effort on the part of Jack Widmeyer that took the pep from Mardella and enabled his team to supplant Cambridge as leader of the county high schools on the diamond.

Mardella was nervous and jumpy throughout the opening innings and the Wicomico county champs were away to a bad start, and never could even matters, fighting as they were against a team that made few mistakes.

Mardella was first at bat and made its only real scoring gesture in that opening inning. A Johnson was hit in the ribs by Widmeyer's first pitched ball. Phillips hit to second, forcing Johnson, but went to second himself when Dorsey, trying hard for a double play, threw over Staton's head to the stands.

Hopkins scratched a stinky hit along the third-base line. Phillips making third. On the attempted double steal Hagerstown worked the cut off play perfectly. Dorsey coming in to take the short throw and tipping Phillips at the plate. C. Johnson flied to left to end the session.

The Western Shore champions made the third inning the big session. Dorsey led off with a screaming triple to right center and scored a moment later on a passed ball. Wellinger walked, went to second on a passed ball, but when Snyder hit to Hopkins was trapped between second and third and run down. Snyder stole second, Robeson walked. Younkins lifted a pop fly to Hopkins, but Staton came through in the pinch with a double, scoring both runners. Heard struck out.

Hagerstown made its last two runs in the seventh. After Weibel fanned Dorsey singled and came home on Wellinger's double. Wellinger stole third and counted on a squeeze play. Snyder bunting perfectly.

Widmeyer had excellent control and, despite three errors, his mates backed him up well. The midway pair scooped up hard grounders from the dirt to toss the runners out at first and one double play in the seventh inning checked Mardella before the latter could even begin a rally. Widmeyer did not give a walk until the fifth inning and only three in the entire game. He struck out six and in each of the first five innings only three batters faced him.

Hopkins apparently lacked his usual form. He did strike out ten of the opposition, but his control was wobbly and hits were made off his delivery at timely moments by the Washington county batters.

Firpo Dorsey, captain of the team, led the Hagerstown attack with a triple and two singles in four times at bat. He also accounted for three of the runs. Eddie Semler, coach of the Hagerstown team, developed a thinking, alert club that proved its right to the championship with a clever exhibition of base ball.

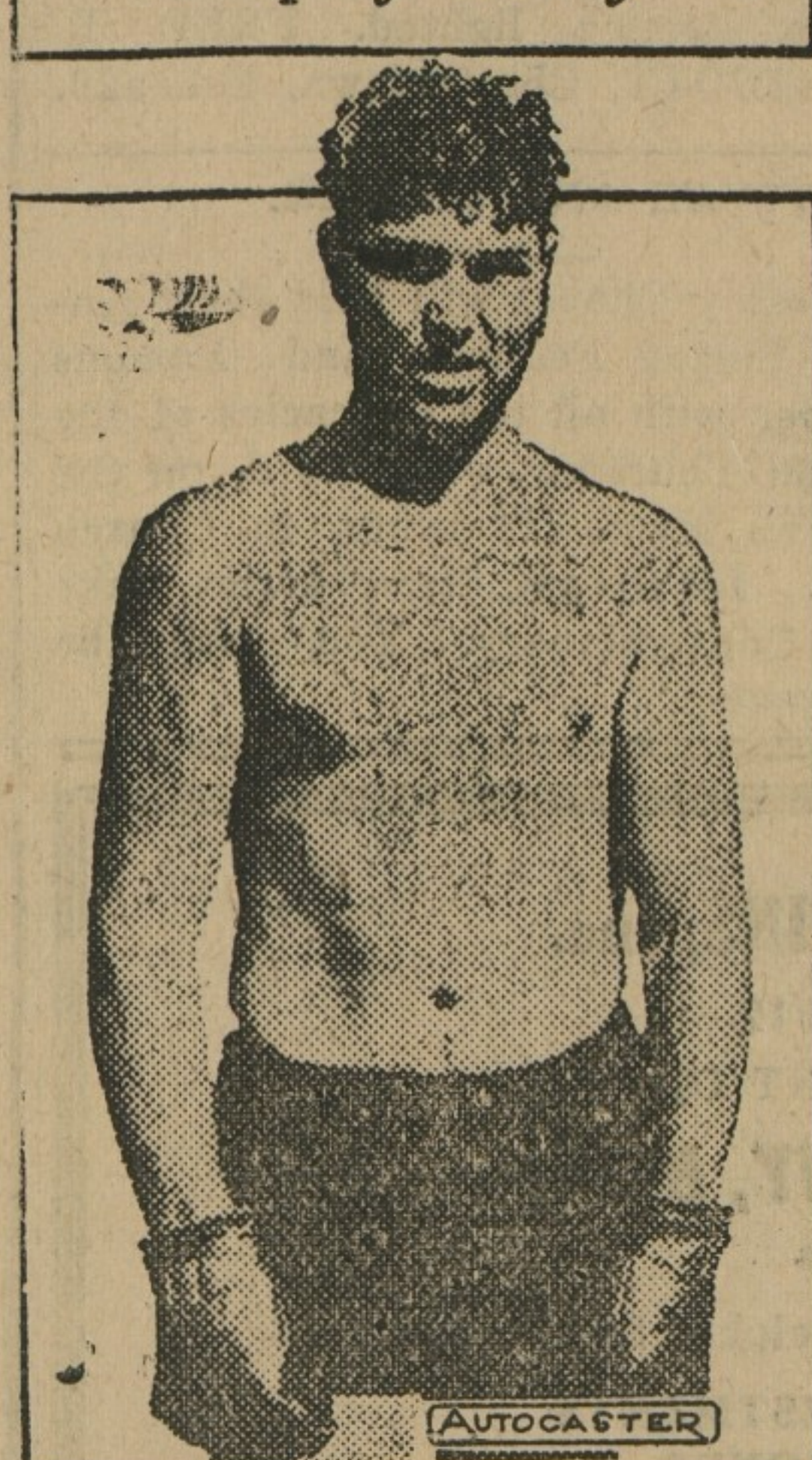

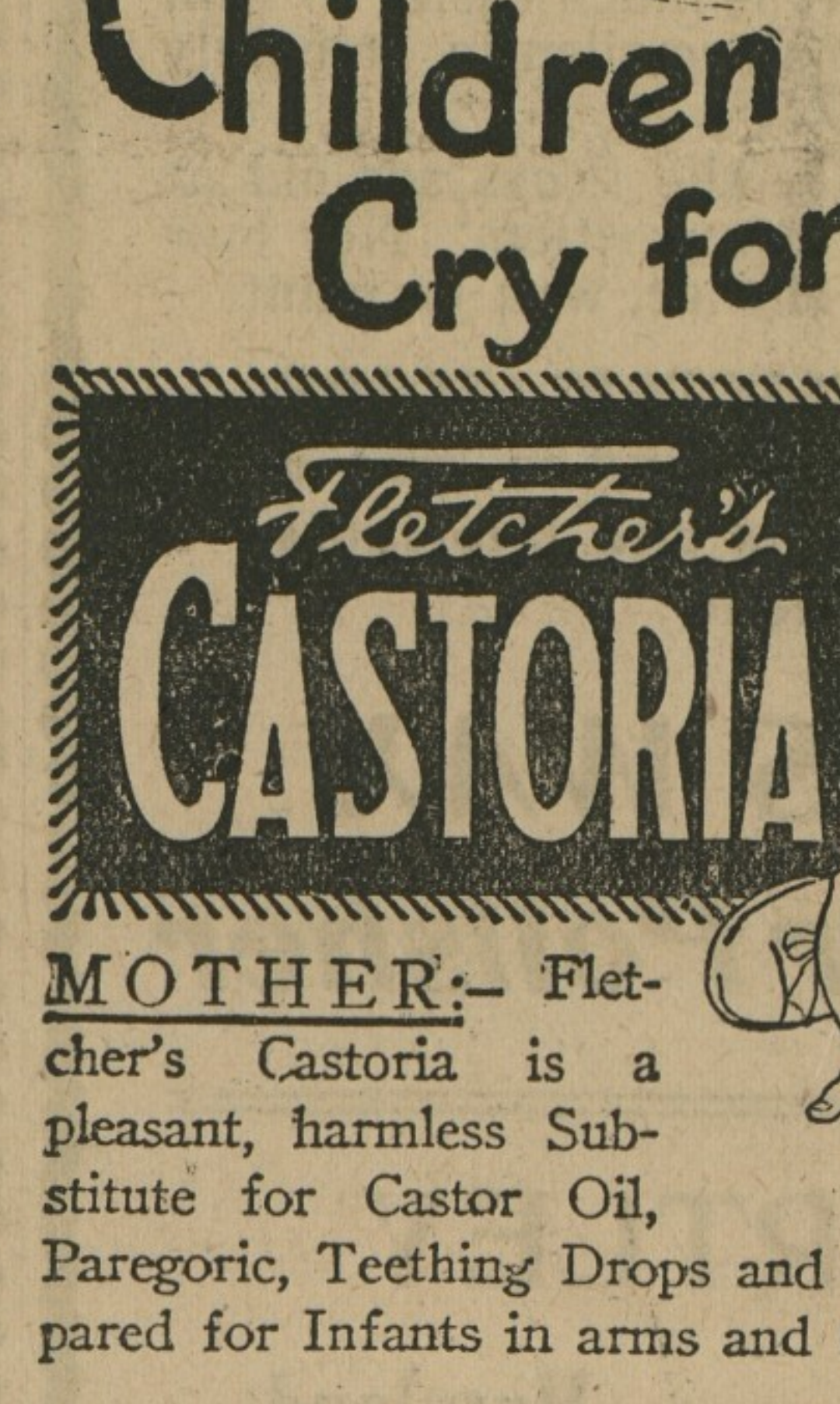
Rock Hall 'oo Hot For Fairlee

Kent Gets Lone Point In State Meet

Kent County was able to gather but a lone point in the annual State Olympic meet held last Friday in Baltimore.

Allegany for the third successive year made the best score among the counties, although Baltimore City totaled the greatest number of points when they added up 103.

Only one record was broken at the meet. George Alfred Noble, of Caroline County bettered the mark in the 80 pound class broad jump when he leaped 8 feet 1 3/4 inches. The old mark was 7 feet 11 inches.

Kent's lone point was scored by Maxwell Wallis, of Worton, who captured fourth place in the base ball throw for distance in three 95 pound class. The winning throw was 246 feet 9 inches.

The Kent delegation went to Baltimore Thursday morning and returned on Saturday morning. It was said on Monday that several of the Kent athletes refused to run on the day of the meet.
