Washington Wins Over St. Johns In First Ball Game

8 To 7 Victory In Ten Innings Gives Kibler Nine Edge

Dumschott Star Of Contest

Washington College is one up on St. Johns since the two schools have agreed once more to be friendly rivals. By virtue of an 8 to 7 victory in a ten-inning baseball contest last Friday Washington goes into the lead in games won and lost under the new order of things.

The Johnnies died hard and it was only after the game had gone into the extra session that they gave up the ghost of the ball game.

Three successive walks and Dopschott's pretty blow to right field was what actually sent the Johnnies under. Up until that moment in the final half of the tenth the game had belonged to either side.

The lead had seen-sawed back and forth several times. St. Johns scored first in the third when they pushed a trio of markers across the plate. Washington soon tied the score and a little later went into the lead by a 5 to 3. St. Johns came to life again and forced the Kibbies to relinquish their margin of supremacy and at the same time went ahead 7 to 5. Washington by a noble effort knotted the count and thus the games went into the tenth inning. Here, after Bennett, who had twirled the game so far had retired one man, Coach Kibler removed him in favor of Carroll. It was a strategic move. The big left-hander came into the box with a pair of wrong side hitters coming up. These two had been cracking the ball lively all day. Carroll caused one to hit out on an infield fly and then proceeded to strike the last one out.

Roseberry twirling for St. Johns passed the first two to face him in the tenth and then Bock was led to the mound. He let Dumschott stroll filling the sacks. Dopschott came up with the stage set for a hero act. He did not let the opportunity pass. Looking the first one over he took a shot at the second and sent it sailing into right field while Jess came in with the winning run. Thus ended the revival of the Washington-St. Johns feud.

The game was a typical college affair. Errors and brilliant play were mixed with about the right proportion to make the game interesting.

Bennett, on the mound for Washington started off like a young cyclone and fanned the first two batters to face him. After that he could not get three strikes on a single batter. He was in hot water most of the time. Poor throws by Jess and Wright helped to make his position on the peak rather dangerous but at the same time the St. Johns nine was tapping the ball with a sickening regularity.

The work of Dumschott behind the bat was easily the feature of the game. His receiving was of a higher calibre than any seen on a local team for several years. Especially good was the way in which he handled all the foul flies in his territory. Five times he saved Bennett from possible defeat by going far and wide to retrieve the foul pops. One catch in particular has only been equalled on the local field in one other game. When he races back against the Washington dug out to make a brilliant catch he equalled the catch that the Baltimore Dry Dock catcher retired Frank Baker on several years ago. The "Flying Dutchman" also hit the ball at a lively clip.

Jess furnished the hitting thrill of the contest when he bounced one in to the bleachers to tie the score at three all.

St. Johns presented a good college ball club. They played well and fought hard.

Roseberry, who did the pitching act struck out eleven of the Washington batters.

The Washington nine played without the services of Cavanaugh and Giraitis. Cavanaugh was called to Waterbury, Conn., because of the illness of his father and Giraitis was suffering from a finger injury. This caused Coach Kibler to use two green men on the right side of the diamond. Dopschott was brought in from Center field to cover first and Burke was sent to second.

Washington College and St. Johns became enemies again last Friday when they crossed bats for the first time in several years.

The Washington College baseball squad left today on a four-day trip during which time they will meet four

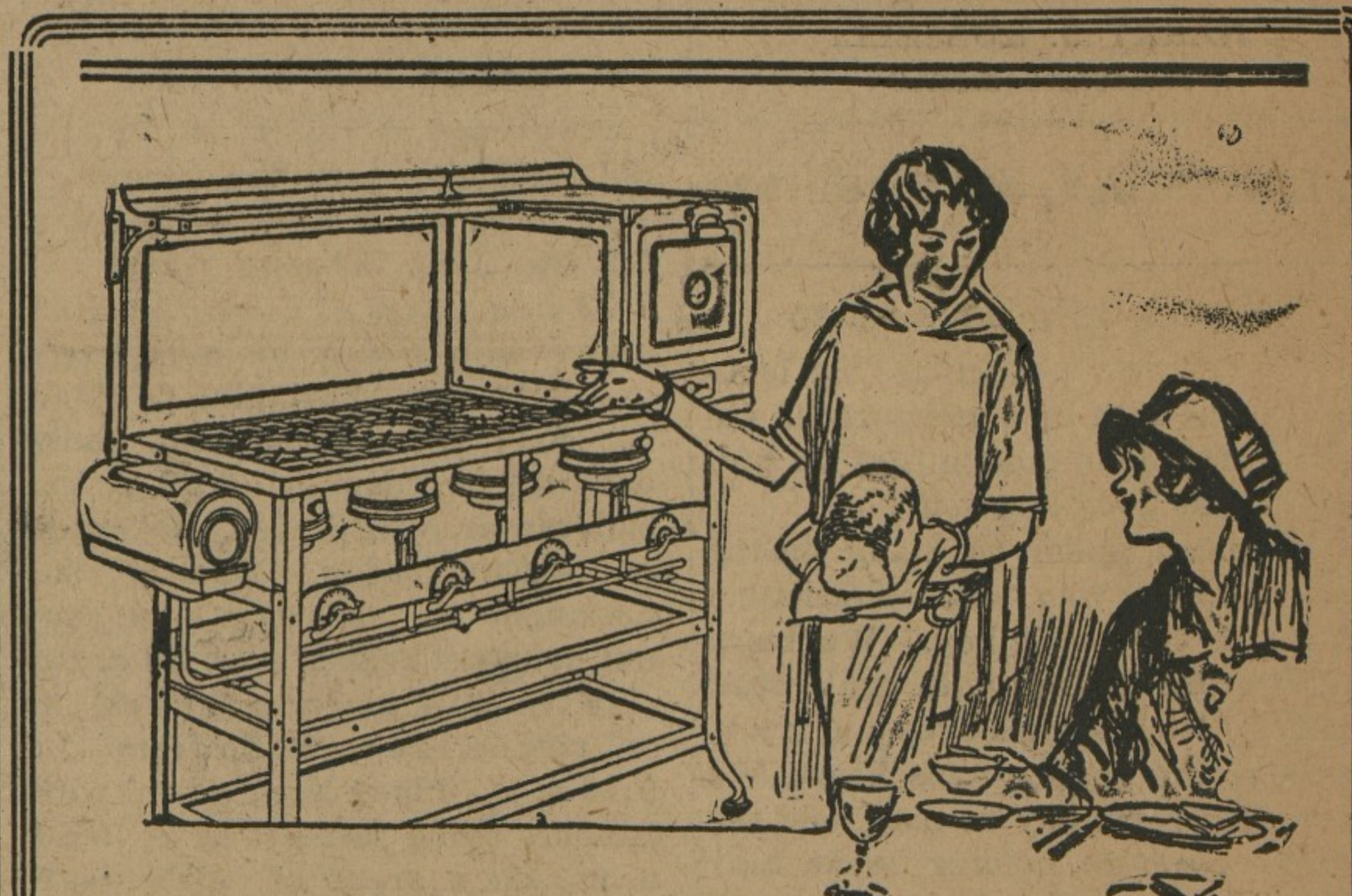
of the strongest teams in the Middle Atlantic District.

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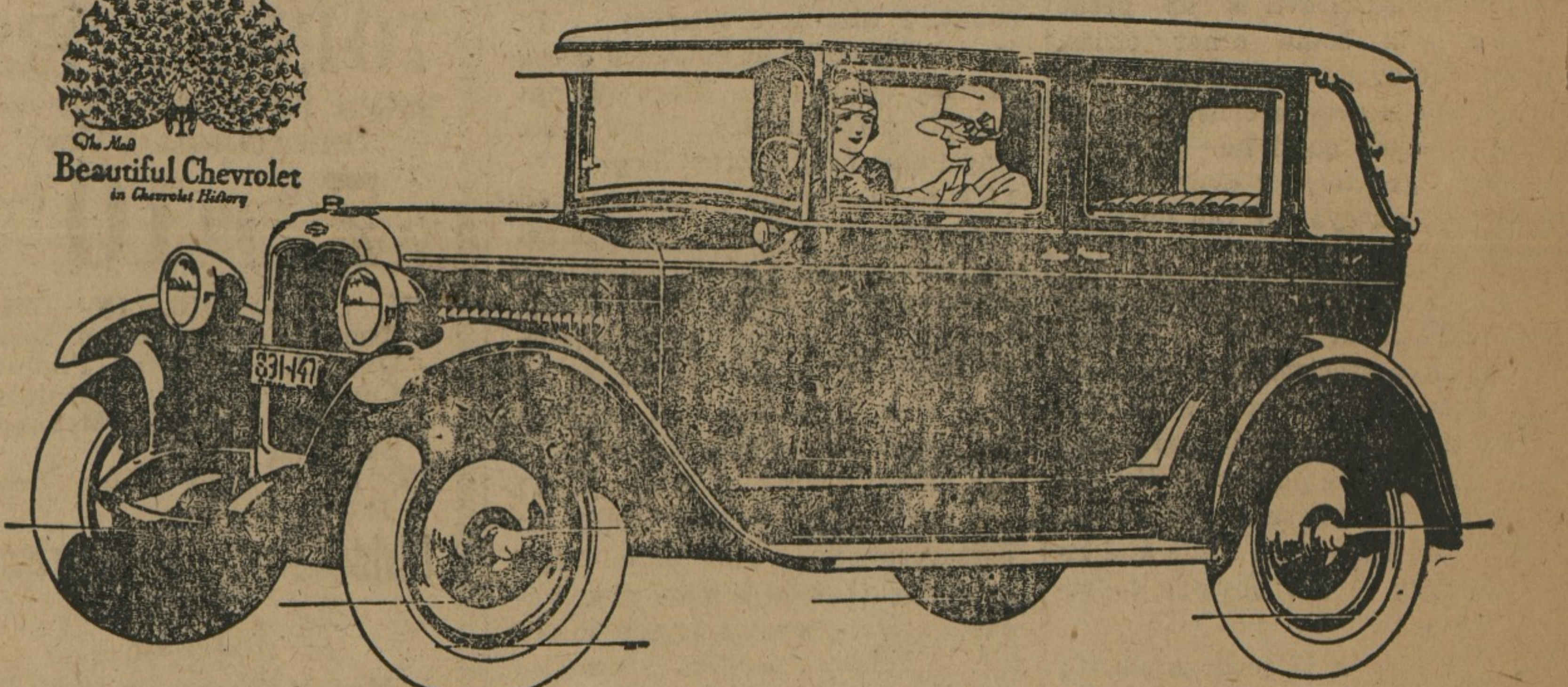
