We plead guilty to being among that number who are irresistibly drawn to the small boy. We know that we are dealing with soul stuff when we look into his eyes and try to fathom the depth of his heart.

These reflections come to us as we think of Boys' Week which is to be observed in Chestertown from May 26 to May 30.

CARPING CRITICS

Many times are men, inspired by the desire to be of some service to others, have been lost to community activities because of the chance remark of some carping critic.

Such men are so constituted that they are offended when the ruthless critic says something of them in their public service work and misinterprets their motives.

Men of this type should never be driven from their course by the sting of sarcasm that may come from those who are not in sympathy with any movement for community betterment.

It is folly to pay any attention to the carping critic. He is the citizen who sees little good in any laudable undertaking because he fears it will cost him something or he bears a grudge against some of the leaders.

The man who has taken any part in community enterprises knows from experience that he has to put on his armor to ward off the poison darts of the carping critics who give few people credit for being honestly interested.

STANDING IN OUR OWN LIGHT

There is vastly more in the slogan "Buy at Home" than a mere appeal to local pride, local patriotism and public spirit, and local self-interest. It ought not to be necessary to point to any of these things as the duty, or rather the high privilege of every resident of the community in keeping it prosperous.

If the money we make here is to be sent away to enrich other places, we are standing in our own light. We do not believe the evil is as great here as it is in some other cities, perhaps, but every individual case in which goods are purchased out of town when they could be procured here at no greater, or even at less cost, is a black eye for the business community.

It must be born in mind that purchases made from door to door salesmen have precisely the same effect as though the money were sent direct to the mail order houses out of town. This city is poorer by the aggregate sum of all such purchases and he effect upon local trade and local prosperity is too obvious to require comment.

Thoughtlessness is responsible for it, but that is a poor excuse for making it more difficult for the local merchant to give full service, to carry full stocks, to expand his business to the class of merchandise he desires to carry.

Another injustice is that the mail order business is all cash whereas the local merchant is accommodating to his local trade. It is unfair to use the local man's capital for certain necessities and then to send away cash for the other things that could be had here.

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Letters To The Editor

Editor Chestertown Enterprise, Chestertown, Maryland, Dear Sir:

The Maryland Geological Survey has just issued a report on the Physical Features of Kent County. The first chapter gives an historical review of the development of our knowledge of the county and bibliography of the various works which have appeared treating of Maryland as a whole or giving special information regarding the local details of Kent County.

A chapter deals with the physiography, geology, and mineral resources of the county, discussing the topographic features such as the terraced plains; the geological formations and their subdivisions with brief descriptions of the natural deposits of sands, clays and marls; and water resources. The chapter on soils describes at some length the various soil types found within the county and the uses to which the various types are best adapted. The chapter on climate of Kent County gives a brief discussion on the average temperature and precipitation, together with a few remarks on the growing season.

The chapter on magnetic declination describes the meridian line established by the Survey in 1897 and the changes in magnetic variation at Chestertown from 1700 to 1925. The chapter on forests illustrates the various forest types and the future of forests in the county.

This report should prove of interest to many of your subscribers and I would appreciate it if you will send me any statement which you may incorporate in your paper.

Copies of the report may be secured by citizens of the county who will write to the State Geologist, Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, the postage and packing being 10 cents.
